FOUNDRY PROJECT IS APPROVED

Commercial Club Pledges Free Site For Factory of Economy Boiler Co.

The Willmar Commercial Club last night endorsed the plan under which it is proposed to locate the foundry and factory of the Economy Boiler Company at Willmar, and pledged the donation of two acres of ground near the railroad track as a site for the same.

The committee composed of Messrs. Russell Spicer, P. C. Peterson and Ben Benson submitted an unqualified approval of the concern and the product of its manufacture. Their investigation of the financial and business abilities of the promoters and backers of the company was a searching and rigid one, they say, and they found all conditions to be as presented by Mr. Laramie last week.

The company is capitalized at \$100,000. F. G. Walling, the president, is a successful building contractor, who has been working on perfecting a heating boiler for the past eight years. The manufacture of these boilers was begun three years ago and a number of them have been in practical operation for two winters. They have given the best of satisfaction and have proven their utility by the large saving effected in fuel, so that now the company cannot supply the demand with their present facilities.

Mr. Walling says that they would not think of erecting a foundry at the present time owing to labor conditions and have been looking about for a smaller city in which to locate their factory. The shipping advantage of the large cities are more than offset by the difference in labor conditions in favor of the smaller town. Some stock is to be offered at Willmar, but to eliminate any chance for loss Mr. Walling has placed valuable equities in Minneapolis real estate in trust with a contract to buy back in 1916 the stock issued at par from anyone who wishes to dispose of it. The value of these properties was investigated by the committee and found satisfactory. Mr. Walling will have charge of the selling end of the business and the factory will be in charge of Mr. J. W. Rosche, at present with the Flour City Ornamental Works, who is a thorough mechanic and practical founder. It is proposed to build a foundry building about 75x100 feet so designed that it may be added to as needed. The latest foundry machinery is to be installed and a force of 12 to 15 men will be needed for each shift at the outset, with the prospect for a rapid increase if the business develops as the men who are staking their all on the proposition have faith that it will. A local board of directors is to have control of the financial direction of the business for three years. It is likely that a site in the west end of town will be selected.

The proposition is an unusual one, but it has found favor with all our local business men who have investigated the matter. They believe that this foundry, if its location at Willmar becomes assured, will give Willmar a growing industry that will give employment to many men.

The first play of the game nearly resulted in a touchdown for the visitors, too, as Sitt "got lost" and had a clear field for a touchdown, as he slipped by Alm, who was playing safety. Yarow, however, caught him from behind and prevented the score.

The work of the high school team in this game was a revelation as they played with a snap and vim that had not been shown in any of the previous games. The victory is all the more glorious as four of the regulars were unable to take part in the game as they were not up to grade in their studies. Even with these four men out of the line, the local's line outweighed the visitors altho the backfields were more nearly of equal weight.

This victory has put lots of "pep" into the practice of the boys, and this, with the added incentive of winning a letter if taking part in games should prove a big help to the team.

We have contended all along that the material was there, and if the team could once get going it would be a hummer. This seems to have been attained at last and now they should wade thru the remaining games with ease. Even the victory for the Alumni team that has been predicted may not materialize. If the boys play as good a game on Thanksgiving afternoon as they did last Saturday, they should win, or at least make the game the most interesting that has ever been played here.

It might be a good idea for the members or at least certain members of the high school squad to keep away from the Alumni bunch when they practice. These practices will be limited in number anyway, and the least that can be expected will be for the members of the team to keep away. It has always been the practice in the past for the members of the Alumni team to work without any interference.

The game last Saturday was devoid of any features. The locals scored 13 in the first half and added to it almost at will during the rest of the game. An interesting fact was that they were not forced to punt once during the entire game, altho once or twice it seemed to the spectators that the play warranted a kick but it was not tried, and as it turned out, the kick was not needed.

Occasionally a forward pass worked for a fair gain, but on the whole, most of the gains were made by Walter Erickson on straight line smashes and on end runs by Holt and Cramer.

Altogether the game was a good one from a local view point and the boys have entered into the practice this week with a spirit that bodes ill for any and all opposition. With the regulars back in the game again this week the team becomes more formidable than ever.

NEW OIL PLANT FOR WILLMAR

Independent Oil Company Has Let Contract For Distributing House Here.

Among the new enterprises coming to Willmar is an independent oil company, to be known as the Bartles-Scott Oil Co., of which Mr. W. E. Scott will be president and controlling director. They have been assigned a site for their plant of oil tanks and warehouses on the Great Northern right-of-way at Ninth street and Pacific avenue. The new firm will handle all grades of oils, gasoline, lubricating oil and greases. The capital stock will be \$10,000. Mr. C. L. Maguire was in the city Monday to locate site. The contracts for erection of tanks, etc., have been let, we understand, and the work will begin at once. The location of this new enterprise proves that the advantages of Willmar as a distributing point are becoming recognized.
