White House Newlyweds Go Abroad for Their Honeymoon.



SAYRES SAIL FOR EUROPE

Manage to Dodge Sightseers When Boarding Steamer.

New York, Nov. 30.—The elusive White House bride and bridegroom—Mrs. and Mrs. Francis B. Sayre—avoiding the gaily decorated gangway and bunting bedecked pathway arranged for them, slipped quietly aboard the liner George Washington and sailed for Europe on their honeymoon. A great crowd on the docks at Hoboken was keenly disappointed.

RESTRAINT LAID TO TIN CAN TRUST

Government Begins Suit for Dissolution at Baltimore.

Baltimore, Nov. 30.—Suit was filed in the United States district court here to dissolve the American Can company, the so called tin can trust, which the department of justice alleges controls a large percentage of business of the United States in tin cans, containers and packages of tin.

The American Sheet and Tin Plate company was made a defendant because of an agreement it is alleged to have with the American company to sell it tin for cans at a preferential rate.

In its complaint the government alleges practices in restraint of trade agreements by absorbed concerns not to re-enter the field, contracts by consumers to buy from the "trust" exclusively and arbitrary fixing of prices.

Attorney General McReynolds asked in the bill for a dissolution other than on a pro rata basis by asking for a separation into units of different ownership to insure the restoration of competition.

FOURTEEN THOUSAND IDLE

General Electric Company Employees Quit Work.

Schenectady, N. Y., Nov. 26.—With more than fourteen thousand employees of the General Electric company voluntarily idle this city faces an industrial crisis. Aside from meetings of workmen and orderly crowds in the streets and about the labor union meeting halls there is no excitement resulting from the walk-out of nearly all of the forces of the largest manufacturing plant of its kind in the world.

HOPING FOR DRY CHICAGO

Campaign Begun to Vote Out Saloons in 1915.

Chicago, Nov. 27.—Temperance forces of Chicago will launch immediately a campaign to vote out the city's saloons in April, 1915. The movement, which will include plans for the election of a "dry" mayor at the same time, was decided upon by representatives of the Anti-Saloon league, the Women's Christian Temperance union, the Prohibition party and church members.

CONFESSES TO MANY FIRES

Winona (Minn.) Man Says He Craved Excitement.

Frank Norton, aged twenty-four years, arrested at Winona, is said to have confessed to the police that he set fire to thirty buildings in that town because he craved excitement.

The arrest grew out of an investigation that C. E. Keller, state fire marshal, has conducted for the last month.

In his alleged confession Norton is said to implicate Ernest Cook, also under arrest. Cook, according to Mr. Keller, is not mentally sound.

Norton, according to state and Winona officials, was arrested while in the act of setting fire to a barn. Since Oct. 1 Winona has had fifty fires, which the authorities have believed to have been of incendiary origin.

CANAL BUILDER NEAR DEATH

Physicians Give Up Hope for Lieutenant Colonel Galliard.

Baltimore, Nov. 29.—Physicians of the Phipps psychiatric clinic at Johns Hopkins hospital announced that practically all hope has been abandoned for the recovery of Lieutenant Colonel David Du Boise Galliard, the army engineer who dug Culebra cut in the Panama canal against almost insurmountable obstacles.

Pimple Causes Death.

Because he opened a slight eruption on his face with a pocketknife Maurice E. Phalen is dead at his home in Gilmore valley, a few miles from Winona. The pimple was painful and he opened it. Blood poison developed. He sank rapidly until death ensued.
