ORDINANCE NO. 138. An Ordinance Prohibiting Fast Driving on the Streets.

Be it ordained by the City of Willmar as follows: Section 1. No person shall drive any horse or horses through or upon any of the public streets within the limits of the City of Willmar at a rate of speed exceeding ten miles per hour, nor shall any person drive or ride, or cause to be driven or ridden, any horse or horses on any of the public streets within the limits of the said City in a reckless or careless manner or in any manner to endanger the safety of others.

Section 2. Any provision violating any provision of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof before the municipal Court of said City or before any Court having jurisdiction, be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00 or by imprisonment for not less than five nor more than 60 days.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF The Bartles-Scott Oil Company

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, that we the undersigned do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the provision of Title two (2), Chapter thirty-four (34), of the General Statutes of the State of Minnesota, and the articles and by-laws thereof and supplementary thereto, and for that purpose we do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation.

ARTICLE I. The name of this corporation shall be The Bartles-Scott Oil Company and the general nature of the business of this corporation shall be to manufacture, purchase, sell and deal in petroleum oils and other products of petroleum and to manufacture axle grease and other forms of grease and to manufacture and compound lubricating oils and other products of petroleum and to conduct such other business as may be incidental and necessary thereto.

The principal place of transacting the business of this corporation shall be in the City of Willmar, State of Minnesota.

ARTICLE II. The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be November first, 1913 and the period of its continuance shall be thirty (30) years.

ARTICLE III. The amount of capital stock of this corporation shall be ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), and shall be divided into one hundred (100) shares of One hundred dollars (\$100) each, which shall be issued and paid for in money or moneys worth, in such amounts and at such times as may be directed or required by the Board of Directors.

The corporation may commence business when six thousand dollars (\$6,000) par value of stock shall have been subscribed and paid for.

ARTICLE IV. The highest amount of indebtedness to which this corporation shall at any time be subject shall be the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000).

ARTICLE V. The names and places of residence of the persons forming this corporation are as follows: Joseph Bartles, City of St. Paul, State of Minnesota. W. E. Scott, City of Willmar, State of Minnesota. C. L. Maguire, City of St. Paul, State of Minnesota.

ARTICLE VI. The government of this corporation and the management of its affairs shall be vested in a board of five directors, who shall elect one of their number who shall be elected at the annual meeting of this corporation, which meeting shall be held on the first Saturday in May of each year, at the office of this corporation, in the City of Willmar, State of Minnesota, or at a special meeting called for that purpose in pursuance of the provisions of the by-laws of this corporation, which shall hereafter be adopted, providing for the meeting of the stockholders.

The names of the first Board of Directors of this corporation shall be Joseph Bartles, W. E. Scott, C. L. Maguire, M. R. Scott and E. S. Maguire, who shall hold office until the annual meeting of this corporation from the time of its organization and until their successors are elected and qualified.

The officers of this corporation shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be annually elected by the Board of Directors, at the annual meeting of said board, held on the same day and immediately succeeding the annual meeting of the stockholders, or at a special meeting called for that purpose in pursuance of the provisions of the by-laws of this corporation, which shall hereafter be adopted, providing for the meeting of the stockholders.

The first President and Treasurer of this corporation shall be W. E. Scott, the first Vice-President shall be Joseph Bartles and the first Secretary shall be C. L. Maguire, all of whom shall hold their respective offices from the organization of this corporation and until their successors are elected and qualified.
