### OF INTEREST TO SCANDINAVIANS

Recent Happenings in This Country and Abroad.

**ARRANGE DIVORCE DETAILS**

Commissioners to Meet at St. Petersburg in Case of Prince William of Sweden and Wife—Norwegian Government Planning to Electrify State Railroads—Famous Frescoes at Copenhagen Museum to Be Restored.

\*\*\*\*\* SWEDEN. \*\*\*\*\*

The divorce proceedings pending between Prince William of Sweden and his wife, who before her marriage in 1908 was Grand Duchess Maria Pavlovna of Russia, advanced last week through the appointment of special commissioners who are to meet in St. Petersburg to arrange matters that arise out of the dissolution of the royal marriage. King Gustaf has commissioned Dr. Otto Hack Roland Pritzkiold, chief marshal of his court, and Dr. Knut Hjalmar Leonard

Hammarskiold, governor of Upsala, to go to St. Petersburg to discuss with the representative of the emperor of Russia the question of financial arrangements and the custody of the only child of the marriage, Prince Leonard. The princess, who is a daughter of the Grand Duke Paul Alexandrovich and a cousin of the emperor of Russia, is in her twenty-fourth year. She recently left her husband, a son of the king of Sweden, twenty-nine years old.

The so called "Bondetaget" (Peasants' Army), which is composed of northern and central farmers of Sweden, which is to march on Stockholm and call on King Gustaf and impress upon him and the Swedish riksdag the importance of making the necessary measures for Sweden's national defense against the encroachments of Russia, is interesting all Sweden, as well as calling forth a great deal of publicity and comment in the press of foreign countries. Chicago papers have published long articles regarding this army of courageous men who stand ready to defend the fatherland and who are a very earnest set of men. Chicago Sweden sent King Gustaf a cablegram last week, which was worded as follows: "Chicago Swedes express their sympathy with the efforts of the home Swedes in making to defend the ancient independence of the fatherland." The reply from King Gustaf follows: "Thankful for your message of cheer and sympathy you express; I have the honor of remaining yours very sincerely—Gustaf."

\*\*\*\*\* NORWAY. \*\*\*\*\*

Minnesota's exhibit at the Norwegian centennial at Christiania next year is fast rounding out. It is aimed to have the showing tell all the diversified interests of Norwegians in the Northwest, the greatest settling place for the Scandinavian immigrants to the United States. Three pictures, which will be prominent in the collection, are those of the oldest Norwegian paragon in America, the

first home of the oldest Norwegian newspaper, and two of the earliest Scandinavian pioneers in Minnesota. The oldest Norwegian paragon is located in Rock county, Wisconsin, and is still in use. The first Norwegian paper in the Northwest was started at Immanusville in 1850 and its home is still standing. It was known as the Minneapolis Tidende, a daily paper with a circulation that carries it to Norwegian homes in four states. Very few Norwegians came to Minnesota at an earlier date than Erik and Mathias Nerhaugen. Together with Mathias Ringstad they were the first Norwegian settlers in Goodhue county. They reached there in 1851 and are still active in the affairs of that county.

\*\*\*\*\*

In Norway the government proposes to carry out quite an extensive scheme for applying electric traction to the railroads. According to an official report as to hydraulic resources the state already owns enough water power to serve for nearly all the railroads in the south and west of the country. However, as it is intended to go into the matter on as large a scale as possible, the government is seeking to purchase as many falls as possible in order to obtain the necessary amount of power. A great outlay of capital will be needed to carry out the extensive project. Among the principal railroads are seven lines, including two from Christiania to the Swedish frontier, and others from that city to Gjøvik and Drammen. For the high tension power lines from the turbid stations to the railroads, including also the substations, the outlay is \$12,000,000. Parliament lately decided to begin work on the Christiania-Drammen railroad line. Norway is so rich in hydraulic resources that there is little excuse for the employment of any other power.

\*\*\*\*\*

"Amerikposten" (The America Post) will be the name of a newspaper which is to be published in Christiania in the near future by Gustav Reimers. The paper will be published twice a week and will contain all the latest news regarding Norwegians in America. The first number is to make its appearance during the early part of May.

\*\*\*\*\*

There are at present over 12,000 Swedes in Christiania. There is a movement on foot to erect a new church by the Swedish colony, for which purpose the sum of 40,000 crowns has already been subscribed.

\*\*\*\*\*

The department of justice has awarded 50,000 crowns to the fishermen and their families who were rendered destitute in the storms of November last, which raged all along the western coast of Norway.

\*\*\*\*\*

Mr. Franklin Mott Gunter of Virginia has been chosen secretary to the United States legation in Christiania. Halvard Askeland will be retained at the legation as assistant and private secretary.
