ORDINANCE NO. 140.

An Ordinance to Compel the Removal of Snow and Ice From the Sidewalks of the City of Willmar.

Be it ordained by the City of Willmar as follows:

Section 1. It shall be the duty of every owner or occupant of premises within the limits of the City of Willmar to keep the sidewalks in front of or along the same free and clear of snow and ice.

Section 2. Every such owner or occupant of premises within the limits of the City of Willmar shall remove all snow and ice on the sidewalk in front of or along said premises within 24 hours after the same has fallen or formed.

Section 3. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof before the Municipal Court of the City of Willmar or before any Court having jurisdiction, be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00 or by imprisonment for not less than five nor more than sixty days.

Section 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 142.

An Ordinance to Compel the Hitching of Horses or Other Animals Attached to Vehicles.

Be it ordained by the City of Willmar as follows:

Section 1. No person shall leave any horse or horses, or other animal or animals, attached to any wagon, cart, sled, carriage or other vehicle, in or upon any of the streets, alleys or public places within the limits of the City of Willmar, unless the same be securely tied, hitched or fastened or held by some competent person; provided however that the provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to any animal or animals attached to any vehicle while the person in charge thereof is engaged in loading or unloading the same providing such person in charge thereof remains at all times during such loading or unloading near enough to such vehicle to promptly reach and control the animal or animals attached thereto.

Section 2. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof before the Municipal Court of said City or before any Court having jurisdiction, be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00 or by imprisonment for not less than five nor more than sixty days.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 141.

An Ordinance to Regulate and Prevent the Use of Firearms and Explosives Within the Limits of the City of Willmar.

Be it ordained by the City of Willmar as follows:

Section 1. No person shall willfully discharge any gun, pistol, revolver or other firearm, or discharge, set off or explode any dangerous or explosive substance within the limits of the City of Willmar, unless written permission therefor has first been given by the Mayor of said City.

Section 2. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof before the Municipal Court of said City or before any Court having jurisdiction, be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$25.00 or by imprisonment for not less than 5 nor more than 30 days.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication.
