Boost the Creamery! The following item was handed up for publication, and we are very happy to give it space: The prospect for a good co-operative creamery seems very bright at the present time. Mr. Jarrett, one of the committee that was appointed to sell shares, reports that he has sold 36 shares and expects to dispose of a few more. The other four members of the committee have not yet made any report, but no doubt they are all doing good work in their different localities. Of course there are some who are a little skeptical in regard to the success of a local creamery on account of the failure of some in the past, but time and conditions have changed and today there is nothing more sure or success than a co-operative creamery well patronized.

Laws have been passed the last year that are very favorable to the local creameries and puts a stop to the practice of centralizers paying more for butter fat at certain points than others, in order to freeze out the local creameries. A well patronized co-operative creamery is a good thing for the country in general. It gives the farmers better returns for their cream than is possible to get otherwise. It increases to a considerable extent the value of land in the surrounding country and no one should hesitate to put their names down for one or more shares. They are only \$25.00 each and it will be money well spent. There is absolutely no chance to lose but a whole lot to gain, the only risk any one can possibly take is that of getting better returns from their cows in the future than they have in the past. Now everyone boost and see in how short a time the rest of the shares can be sold and get to work at the creamery.


Manager is Here.
