## NEW HOME FOR MAJESTIC

#### Motion Picture Theatre to Occupy New Building Soon.

M. H. Carey, proprietor of the Majestic theatre, has made arrangements to move from his present location and in a short time expects to occupy the building where Elfrum's Drug Store is now located. For some time past the present building has been too small to accommodate the crowds, and when the chance came to secure the new location, Mr. Carey snapped it up.

Final arrangements were made and the contract let Monday of this week, and work will be commenced at once and rushed as fast as possible. The contract was let to C. Beckwith of Minneapolis, and the building is to be ready for occupancy about the middle of April.

Mr. Carey plans on spending between \$2,500 and \$3,000 in fixing up the new place and when it is finished it will be second to none. There will be seating capacity for 320 persons in the new building and the seats will be wider and less crowded than at present. There will be one wide aisle, running down the center of the house.

The front will be set in from the street and there will be no steps to climb as the floor will drop into the basement. It is planned to have the front composed of white tile, stucco and concrete. The inside will be paneled and nicely decorated.

There will be an orchestra pit at the front of the house, and a hot air heating plant will be installed.

A modern ventilating system will also be installed, designed to always furnish plenty of fresh air.
