

FIGHT ON HOG CHOLERA IS ON

County Agent Poe Gives Timely Advice and Urges Co-operation.

Will there be as much hog cholera this season as last? This will depend upon the manner in which the people take hold of the problem. A few cases of cholera have already been reported. On one farm, what appears to be a very virulent outbreak, has occurred, several hogs dying in one day without showing previous sickness. Several herds that have been examined show sickness that may later prove to be cholera.

To check the spread of this disease, it will be necessary for every one to make a special effort to aid in controlling the disease. The law definitely states that it is any person's duty, knowing of the existence of an infectious disease, to report the same to the board of health which, in the township, is the town board. It is then the duty of the town board to quarantine the infected farm, and to see that proper disposal of the carcasses is made by burning or burying at least 10 feet deep.

Vaccination will give good results if used before hogs get too sick, or if the double treatment is used on well hogs. State serum can be secured for all infected herds. In case serum is wanted for an infected herd, telephone to any high school agriculturist, or to the county agent; or phone directly to the Veterinary Division, University Farm, St. Paul, Minn.

In case state serum can not be secured, either for infected herds or for double vaccination in well herds, good reliable serum is kept on hand at Willmar for the use of residents of the county. This can be secured at a cost of about 1.6c per C. C., whereas the regular price of commercial serum is 2c.

The series of meetings held in twenty-six townships during the last four weeks have been very successful. The total attendance has been 914 and the average attendance 35.5.

The Primary and Fall State and County Elections was taken up. The following citizens were on motion appointed as election judges: For First Ward: L. A. Wold M. O. Thorpe and J. L. Johnson.

For Second Ward: J. H. Martin, J. Williams and J. W. Kent. For Third Ward: A. H. Sperry, G. P. Karwand and Edvard Johnson. For Fourth Ward: A. O. Norman, Henry Stenson and J. A. Hedra.

Alderman Norman offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted: RESOLUTION. Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Willmar that the following places in the City of Willmar, be and the same are hereby designated as the polling places for the State and County Primary Election to be held on Tuesday, June 16th, 1914, and the General State and County Election to be held Nov. 3rd, 1914.

First Ward: Seminary Hall on Nelson Council Chambers, City Hall Building, Willmar, Minn., May 25, 1914. Regular meeting of the City Council with Mayor Wellin in the chair. The following members of the Council were present on roll call: Mayor Wellin, Alderman Johnson, Benson, Martin, Kent, Sperry, Tjosvold, Norman and Erickson; 9 absent, none.

City Attorney Sanford was also present. The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and the same were approved. C. W. Odell appeared and asked that the action taken by the Council at meeting held April 27th, 1914, granting him permission to connect residence on lot 4 of block 61, and run pipe through lot 7 of same block and connect with the 6th street sewer, BE RESCINDED, as he had other plans for building sewer.

On motion the action taken at the said former meeting with reference to said matter, was rescinded. Mr. Odell was on motion granted permission to build 255 feet of 8-inch sewer on Minnesota avenue west from 6th street; the cost of which will be \$120, he to pay \$100 of said amount as tapping fee for sewer permits for lots 7 and 8 of block 61, and the City to pay \$20 of said cost out of the Sewer Fund; the said sewer to become the property of the City when completed and the sewer to be built according to the sewer specifications and under the supervision of the City Engineer.

Mr. Odell called attention to the need of having a "Rest-room" in the City and a committee consisting of Aldermen Tjosvold, Kent and Martin were appointed to take up the matter with the auto club. Ole Jermstad appeared and presented a petition signed by himself, A. Bjorsell and others asking for an extension of the Trotter avenue sewer in Third ward from Anthony street 150 feet south of Litchfield avenue. There were guarantees for eight sewer taps on said petition.

It was on motion authorized that the City contribute \$28.00 out of the Sewer Fund in building said extension if it all could be built for the total of the taps guaranteed in addition to the \$99.00 the City will contribute, and said sewer to be built according to the sewer specifications and under the supervision of the City Engineer and to become the property of the City when completed.

IMPROVEMENTS AT FAIRVIEW CEMETERY

Ladies' League Takes the Initiative and Asks the Co-operation of All Citizens Interested.

Noteworthy improvements are being made at the Fairview cemetery under the direction and initiative of the Ladies' Fairview Cemetery Improvement League. The grounds are being cleaned up, the grass mowed and other various improvements made. New cement posts have been placed at the entrance and new iron gates will be put in later. Five new iron settees have been promised by the officers of the Cemetery Association and Mayor Wellin which will be a welcome convenience. The League is planning to make the cemetery a beautiful spot and are to be commended in their efforts.

All lot owners who have had Mr. Rasmussen care for their property in the past are requested to personally see him in regard to the work they want done this year. The Ladies of the League are only interviewing the lot owners who in years past have personally attended to the work that has been done, and soliciting aid from people who own lots in the cemetery but have removed from the city and are thus not in position to personally look after their property.

The caretaker is experiencing considerable difficulty in identifying a few of the graves that are not marked sufficiently, hence if anyone visiting the cemetery should find graves in which they are interested are not cared for satisfactorily, they are kindly asked to take the matter up with any member of the inspection committee, composed of Messrs. Andrew Larson, L. Rodun and Alton Crosby, who will personally attend to having the work done. The Ladies of the Improvement League are hoping that every citizen

RESOLUTION

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Willmar that the City Clerk be and he hereby is authorized to issue warrants against the respective funds in payment of the foregoing approved bills.

Approved May 26th, 1914. E. C. WELLIN, Mayor. The following resolution passed by the Water & Light Commission was presented: "Resolved, that the Water main on Trotter avenue be tapped at the intersection of 1st street, and that a main be laid from said point of tapping in a southerly direction along said 1st street to the intersection of Minnesota avenue, and there terminating."

Resolved further that a fire hydrant be established and connected with said main at the intersection of Minnesota avenue and 1st street. Alderman Johnson presented the following resolution which was unanimously adopted: RESOLUTION. Whereas, The Water & Light Board have resolved to extend the water main from the intersection of 1st street and Trotter avenue south along 1st street to the intersection of 1st street and Minnesota avenue, and there terminating, and that a fire hydrant be established at the point of termination.

Therefore Resolved, That the action of said Board be and the same is hereby approved and that the City proceed to buy and construct said water main. Approved May 26th, 1914. E. C. WELLIN, Mayor. It was reported that the estimated cost of said water extension would be about \$280, which would also include a 4-inch gate valve.

The City Engineer was instructed to prepare plans and specifications for said extension for the next meeting. The following bonds were presented: Contract and guaranty bond of A. P. Bergeson for sidewalk work, signed by surety company, and contract bond and street sprinkling bond of E. M. Sanderson personal surety, and official bonds of E. A. Nelson, Street Com'r. Ole J. Westgard, Night Patrolman, Lewis Fridlund Sec'y. and Coll. W. & L. Dept. Jas. A. Rowat, City Engineer, A. O. Forsberg, City Assessor, and Hans Gunderson, City Clerk, (all surety bonds.)

The said parties were given permission to do said grading, under the supervision of the Street Committee, but that they were asked to put in a 24 inch tile in ditch at their own expense. The Clerk was instructed to order the necessary street signs for streets in the east part of the City, and in other places where they may be needed.

The Committee on heating systems made a verbal report about their inspection of plant at Marshall and about other plants that they had inquired about. The said Committee were given further time in which to make further investigations. Alderman Erickson presented a profile of extension of Third street East from Monongalia to Augusta avenue, in Fourth Ward.

Requisition for supplies from the Water & Light Commission were presented and the Clerk was instructed to order the supplies. The Street Committee were authorized to make repairs on bridge at the outlet of Foot Lake. On motion the Council adjourned. E. C. WELLIN, Mayor. Attest: HANS GUNDERSON, City Clerk.
