The School Teacher.

A good teacher should possess knowledge, skill, heart, power, will power, good eyes and ears, common sense and moral character. In addition, it is necessary that the teacher have the co-operation of school officers and patrons, and that the school house and surrounding be conducive toward good success.

How should the teacher act in the presence of her pupils the first day of school? She should produce a good impression. The language should be plain, but interesting. There should be no show of superiority in power or knowledge.

What should be the programme for the first day at school?

Furnish something from the beginning that will interest; establish order in every movement; inquire how studies have formerly been arranged and how conducted.

First, look through the lesson rapidly, to discover the thought that the selection expresses. Be able to give an illustration or suggestion that will emphasize the thought when the lesson is read.

What should be the attitude of the teacher towards her pupils? The teacher should never act cross, irritable and unsympathetic. The teacher that is cross and unpleasant will never succeed as a teacher no matter how favorable the conditions are otherwise.
