


# Little Oak Tractor

### Crown Gall on Raspberries.

The Minnesota Inspection Service has found a large amount of crown gall on raspberries, and, to some extent, on blackberries in the nurseries of the State. Many nurserymen are aware of the dangerous nature of this disease and are doing all they can, apparently, to eradicate it from amongst the canes. It frequently kills raspberries; consequently any one receiving canes with gall-like swellings on roots or stems, from a nursery, should refuse to accept or pay for same.

The Entomologist has issued an illustrated circular describing this disease and figuring affected raspberries. We will be glad to mail them to parties desiring information in this direction. The plate illustrating the appearance of crown gall is particularly good. Old raspberry plants, if affected, look unhealthy, frequently with scanty leaves or leaves drooping or yellowing. When such plants are pulled, in this latitude, galls are almost invariably found upon them. It stands to reason that young plants growing in the immediate vicinity are almost sure to be affected, either showing galls upon the roots when pulled, or developing them after being planted.
