

## CORNER STONE OF MASONIC TEMPLE

### Laid With Elaborate Ceremonies in Presence of Many People Friday.

Ideal October weather helped make the cornerstone laying ceremony at the new Masonic Hall last Friday most successful. A large number of visitors from other towns were here and a good many people of the city turned out to witness the event.

The procession started from I. O. O. F. building at three o'clock, headed by the Willmar Military Band. It extended several blocks. The line of march was west to Sixth, north to Pacific, east to Fourth, south to Becker, and west to the public library adjoining which the new temple will stand.

The exercises began with the band playing America and prayer by the Grand Chaplain. Grand Master R. E. Denfield then took charge and the impressive cornerstone laying ceremony of the Order was carried out by the members of the Grand Lodge of Minnesota.

After the preliminary announcements, the tin-box containing records and rosters of the Grand Lodge, Mt. Nelo Chapter and Sharon Lodge No. 104 Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, local newspapers, the Masonic code, current coins, etc., was placed in the hollowed portion of the cornerstone.

The Grand Master presided over the ceremony while discoursing on its significance. The stone was lowered and after being placed in position was tested with the square, the level and the plumb. Different members of the Grand lodge, who each spoke the significance of the implement he used. Then the elements of consecration were poured onto the stone—corn, an emblem of plenty; wine, as an emblem of joy and gladness; and oil as an emblem of peace.

Mr. Russell Stewart, who was architect of the building was charged to see well to the completion of the building. Bishop Edsall, an orator of the day, who then introduced and made an eloquent speech, dividing his subject into three parts—Fraternity, Liberty and Loyalty. He applied his subjects to conditions now existing in Colorado, and Europe and Mexico, which might only be solved by the application of these principles. The Church of Christ was paid high tribute under the head of Fraternity. The Bishop's reference to the necessity for religious liberty and its application to the Mexican situation was applauded. At the close of his remarks the Bishop complimented the City of Willmar and congratulated the local lodges on their enterprise in erecting this temple. He was warmly applauded and the American situation was again alluded to by the Chaplain and the playing of the "Star Spangled Banner" by the band marked the close of the ceremony.

Supper was served to all members and visitors at the lodge rooms. Bishop Edsall made another address to the evening to the assembled Masons.

### Alton Sperry, Accidentally Sustains Gun-shot Wounds in Face.

Alton B. Sperry, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Sperry, of this city, met with a severe accident last Sunday evening, when about to return from a hunting trip a few miles southwest of the city. He was in company with George Gaillford and two friends from St. Paul. He had an automatic repeating shotgun and was putting it away in the case while seated in the buggy. He thot all the shells had been extracted, but one remained in the barrel and was exploded while he held the barrel in his hands, in the act of returning it to the gun case. His right cheek was frightfully lacerated from his chin to the ear. The force of the concussion blew him out of the buggy. He was picked up and the horses were driven at top speed towards the city. An auto that had been summoned was met at west end of Becker Avenue and the injured was rushed to the Willmar Hospital. He became much weakened from the loss of blood before the hospital was reached. His cheek was not slashed, the danger of infection seems to be passed, and he is on the road to recovery.

Mr. Sperry is a brakeman on the Great Northern, is popular with his comrades who sympathize with him in his injury and rejoice that it proved less dangerous than was feared.

## FATALLY INJURED BY AN AUTOMOBILE

### Willmar Painter Run Down Outside of Minneapolis Union Station.

Peter H. Peterson, the painter who lives at 409 Jefferson street, was struck by a speeding auto at Minneapolis last Saturday evening and so seriously injured that he died at 11:30 Monday forenoon.

The deceased left for Minneapolis Friday on business connected with the decorations for the new Opera House. He was coming home Saturday on Train No. 9, which leaves Minneapolis at 7:30 p. m.

He left the street car on the platform opposite the depot and was about to cross the street to the depot. He was carrying a suit case in the right hand. An auto car came from the east headed up Hennepin avenue at a good rate of speed and struck Mr. Peterson, smashing the suit case into pieces and giving Mr. Peterson a severe body blow. His legs were not broken as reported in the city papers. One rib was broken and serious internal injuries were sustained, but no external injuries could be found.

The injured man was hurried to the city hospital which was reached at seven o'clock. The name and address of the injured man was found in a note book on his person. Mrs. Peterson was notified and took the first train to Minneapolis and was with her husband until the end, which came Monday shortly before noon.

There were two men on the auto, but the machine sped on without stopping after they hit the man, before anyone who witnessed the accident could get the number of the car. H. D. Thompson, who resides at 3133 Clinton avenue, saw the accident. A report Monday night stated that detectives have found the auto which led to the arrest of the reckless auto driver.

The body was brought to Willmar on Tuesday afternoon's train, and was taken to the home by an escort of Woodmen of which the deceased was a member. The funeral will take place tomorrow at ten o'clock at the residence and 11:00 at the Lutheran Free church, Rev. Michaelson will officiate.

Peter H. Peterson was born Jan. 2, 1877, at Selje, Nordfjord, Norway. He came to Moorhead, Minn., in 1899, and was married in 1895, since when he has lived at Willmar. Besides the grief-stricken wife he leaves to mourn his death, three children—Helen, Florence, Pearl, Harold and Marvin, the oldest 18 and the youngest 4 years old. The stricken family has the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community in their trouble.

## DIES FROM INJURIES IN FOOT BALL GAME

### Big Lake Boy Fatally Injured While Playing Against Willmar High Saturday.

The football game at Montevideo last Saturday between the Windom Institute and the Willmar High School was greatly marred by an accident by which Herbert Holmes, quarterback of the home team was fatally injured about the head. He was rushed to the hospital, and everything possible was done to bring him back to consciousness, but to no avail. A bloodvessel had burst in his brain, and he died at 6:45 o'clock p. m. on Sunday. Holmes was eighteen years of age and his home was at Big Lake, Minn.

The accident happened near the end of third quarter, and put an end to the game which stood 45 to 0 in favor of Willmar at the time. It was a saddened bunch of football fans who came back from Montevideo, and their sad feelings were rendered more acute when the news of the death of Holmes was received. It was an accident pure and simple, and as such it was looked upon by the people of Montevideo, who blame no one.

Services were held at the Windom Institute yesterday and the body was then shipped to Glenwood for burial.

## SMITH PLEADS GUILTY AND IS FINED

Jackson; Harry J. Tremaine, the vice president, has retained Lancaster, Simpson & Purdy and John Jewell of Minneapolis and Davis & Michel of Marshall; D. R. Morrow, the stock holder, has engaged the law firm of Mercer, Swan and Stinchford. Assistant Attorney General J. A. Edgerton will assist County Attorney Otterson. The cases are sure to be hard fought and closely contested.
