

MR. WISE OF STERLING SECURITIES ON TRIAL

Promises to Become Most Drawn-Out Case in History of County.

The trial of the case, State vs. James J. Wise, has dragged its long drawn out way during the past week. The case was called last Wednesday, and after a day's work and a special venire of jurymen the following were finally accepted: Paul Johnson, Charles J. Johnson, Hans P. Jensen, L. M. Lund, William Stroutman, C. G. Johnson, C. B. Danielson, H. F. Peterson, F. C. Peterson, G. C. Haug, Otto Lindquist, Julius Rambo.

The defense is being conducted by Atty. A. B. Jackson assisted by R. W. Stanford, Assistant Attorney General S. A. Edgerton and County Attorney Ottensness are prosecuting the case.

The State rested its case last evening at five o'clock. The following witnesses have been examined by the State: D. R. Morrow, Robert Johnson, Wm. A. Anderson, Neils Quam, M. O. Oppgaard, J. C. One of our county's oldest settlers passed away last Friday morning at 1:30 a. m., when Thomas P. Sherman closed his journey here on earth and passed to the Great Beyond. He was ill for about eight days, death being caused by a complication of diseases and old age. Deceased was born on June 6th, 1830 at Elfors Socken, Hjärjedalen, Sweden. He was married to Segrin Sulson of Svea socken, Hjärjedalen, Sweden, on January 1st, 1858. Together they emigrated to this country in 1861, locating at Vasa, Goodhue county, where they resided for twenty years. In 1881, they moved to Kandiyohi county, locating on a farm east of Willmar. In 1904 they sold their farm and moved into the city where they have made their home since.

He is survived by his aged wife and two children, Peter Sherman of this city and Mrs. Emma Johnson, who resides three miles northeast of the city, also four grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Two children have passed before their father.


