The first half was as evenly and stubbornly fought as any game ever played here, and it was only in the last half that the Willmar subs, who were in the game on account of the absence of many of the regulars, gave away under the strain, and allowed themselves to be run away with.

With Danielson, Severinson, Manley, Holt, Carlson and Erickson out of the game, the locals line was indeed in poor shape to try to stop the charges of their heavier opponents. They managed to stop them for at least half of the game, and but for some very poor work by part of the Willmar backfield, the result might have been different. Time and again a fumble stopped Willmar when it seemed as if a score was inevitable. This fault undoubtedly cost them the game, and it is something that is entirely inexcusable.

Dart, one of Litchfield's backs, was injured early in the game and was forced to retire, but this did not seem to retard the visitors any, as they kept hammering away, until they gained results.

JURY IN WISE CASE FAILED TO AGREE

Sterling Securities Cases Go Over Until Next Term of Court.

The Wise trial came to a close at 5:00 o'clock last Saturday afternoon when the jury after being out over twenty-two hours finally reported that an agreement was impossible. The jury stood seven to five for conviction. Ballot after ballot was taken without any change. A wrangle over some points at issue caused further instructions to be given Saturday forenoon by Judge Qvale but there was no change in the result when balloting was resumed. This case as well as the other Sterling Securities cases were continued over until the spring term of court in March.

The trial of James J. Wise, president of the Sterling Securities corporation on the indictment on the charge of grand larceny in the first degree, on account of stock-selling operations at New London, was begun on Wednesday, Oct. 21 and continued ten days. It was one of the longest drawn out and most closely contested trials ever held at Willmar. Atty. A. H. Jackson for the defense and Ass't. Atty-General for the State pitted legal acumen and cunning against one another. The testimony was all in Thursday evening. Mr. Edgerton addressed the jury Friday morning and Mr. Jackson in the afternoon. Judge Qvale charged the jury at suppertime and they went out at 6:45 to their long vigil which resulted in a draw as above stated. The fact that five jurors stuck out for acquittal was a surprise to the prosecution, and it came as an evident relief to the accused, whose attorney had already arranged for an appeal to the Supreme Court in case of conviction.

OBITUARY

MRS. H. W. MANKELL.

Another of our worthy pioneers left this earthly home on Sunday, October 25th, when the death of Mrs. Mankell occurred at the home of her son, Oscar Mankell, after an illness of only three weeks.

Mrs. Mankell was born June 30th, 1832, at Kollerer Socken Göteborgs län, Sweden, and thus had attained the ripe old age of eighty-two years, three months and twenty-five days. She came to America in 1857, locating first at Red Wing, Minn. Later she has made her home at Northfield and St. Cloud. At the latter place she resided until after the Indian outbreak in 1867 when she came to Kandiyohi county, settling on a homestead in section 20, town of Lake Andrew where she lived until her death. Her death was caused by congestion of the lungs resulting from chronic heart trouble. She was married to Herman W. Mankell in 1857. Her husband died



The Late Mrs. Mankell.


April 1st, 1889. She leaves to mourn her departure, six children. Mrs. A. H. Gordhamer, Norway Lake; Mrs. A. Landquist, of Minneapolis; Mrs. H. L. Melgaard of Argyle, Minn.; Oscar, who resides on the home farm, Otto of New London and Mrs. Gustave A. Erickson of Guthrie Okla., of whom all were present at the funeral but Mrs. Erickson. She also leaves one sister, Mrs. Mathilda Widdich of St. Paul, and one brother, who lives in Sweden, thirty-six grand children and 27 great grand children.

WINFIELD SCOTT HAMMOND

Elected Governor of Minnesota Yesterday by a Plurality Which May Exceed 30,000.

HAMMOND IS CHOSEN

Democrat Wins Min- nesota Contest.

VICTORY IS SWEEPING Majority Over Lee Expected to Exceed 25,000.

St. Paul, Nov. 4.—Winfield Scott Hammond of St. James was elected eighteenth governor of the state of Minnesota by a plurality over his nearest opponent, William E. Lee of Long Prairie, variously estimated at from 25,000 to 35,000.

The victory of the Second district congressman was a sweeping one and his friends see in it a stinging rebuke to the campaign tactics of the opposition who endeavored to make the people believe that Mr. Hammond was under the domination of the brewers and other special interests.

The Democratic leader overwhelmed his Republican opponent in Ramsey county, carrying it by approximately 12,000. Hennepin county, supposedly a Lee stronghold, went for the St. James man by over 5,000. St. Louis county is claimed by the Democrats by 3,000.

The Third congressional district is expected to add at least another 4,000 to the Democratic lead. He also won his own, the Second district, by a comfortable margin, although reports from that section are meager.

In the Seventh and Ninth districts, where Lee counted on a crushing ma-

Jority, he did little better than to break even, according to the preliminary reports. Hammond carried Crookston, Breckenridge, Warren, Ada and other large places, besides polling a surprisingly large vote in the county.

CLOSE RUNS FOR CONGRESS

Democrats May Make Gains in Min- nesota Districts.

St. Paul, Nov. 4.—Democrats seem to have at least held their own in the congressional election in Minnesota. They elected their man in the Fourth district, Ramsey county. It looks as though a Democrat might defeat Lindbergh in the Sixth and there is a possibility of a Democrat winning in the Second district, which was represented by W. S. Hammond.

In the new Tenth a Progressive may be elected. Republicans may be cut down to six representatives from Minnesota.

Meager returns in the congressional race outside of Ramsey county indicated the election of Congressman Sydney Anderson in the First district over H. H. Witherstine; Congressman Charles R. Davis, Republican, in the Third district over Carlos Avery, Democrat; Congressman C. R. Smith in the Fifth district, Republican, over John H. Long, Democrat, and Thomas Van Lear, Socialist; Congressman Clarence B. Miller, Republican, in the Eighth district over Andrew Nelson, Democrat; Congressman Halvor Steenerson, Republican, in the Ninth over M. A. Brattland, Socialist.

Franklin F. Ellsworth, Republican, Mankato, is having a hard fight in the Second with James A. Fillette, Democrat.

NELS JOHNSON.

Mr. Nels Johnson of Svea passed away Saturday, October 24th, at his home, after an illness of about nine months. Mr. Johnson was born on March 8, 1835 at Villans Hårad, Kristianstads län, Sweden.
