ELECTION NOTES.
The total male vote in Kandiyohi county at last week's election exceeded that of the presidential election of 1912 by 214 votes. Of this increase 122 were in the City of Willmar.
Peter A. Gandrud's total majority reached 1,933. He carried Swift county by a majority of 248, receiving 1420 votes to McDermott's 1172.
Peter Bonds, for sheriff, carried the highest vote polled of any candidate voted on in Kandiyohi county who had no opposition, receiving 2851 votes.
Three of the Swift county officials went down to defeat. County Attorney Thornton was defeated by his opponent, J. A. Lee, by 580 votes, and county Supt. Lillie E. Thorsen by Miss Thomson by 1126 votes. Sheriff Johnson was defeated by Gilbert Gilbertson by the slim majority of 15 votes. All the rest of the officials were re-elected or had no opposition.
In Meeker county Senator E. P. Peterson was re-elected over Ex-Senator J. W. Wright 2345 to 907; Magnus Johnson was elected representative; Mike Konshak, sheriff; Chris Bertelson, Judge of Probate; Ray Dart, County attorney; Z. A. Cyr, surveyor; C. H. Atkinson, clerk of court; Anna Osdorf, Supt. of Schools; and Andrew Evenson and Mathew Flynn, commissioners.
