HOME HEALTH CLUB.

NECESSITY OF VENTILATION.
If we could live out of doors all of the time we would be a more healthy race of people than we are now. One can eat more without harmful results and can get along with less exercise. Badly ventilated rooms are the cause of much disease, more than you would think.

All races who lead an outdoor life are better off physically than we are. We humor our throats and lungs and bring on many diseases by improper ventilation. Fresh air and sunlight are the greatest of our blessings. It is a pity they are so cheap. They are not half appreciated.

Make the chest flexible so as to be able to accommodate all the air the lungs can hold. Learn to breathe deeply. So many people, women especially, breathe from the vicinity of their collar bones. They do not know what it is to take a deep breath. Have every room in your house well ventilated, but particularly your bedroom where you spend so much of your time.

Do not ride in stuffy cars if you can help it. It is not always possible to stand on the platform of closed cars, but if the car is so crowded you cannot get inside you are lucky. The open cars of the spring, summer and fall are a delight. Never mind if you feel chilly. You can remedy that—just remember how much air you are getting for a nickel. Take deep breaths while you are riding in the open cars; fill your lungs full.

If you are so fortunate as to be like me, confined to an office during your hours of labor, see to it that the room is well ventilated. Sometimes it is almost impossible. Often someone sits next to a window who is afraid of the least bit of fresh air and the windows are never raised. Insist upon having at least one window lowered from the top—more if you can. See if you can get the "frisky cat" away from the window a few minutes while you air the rooms. Several times during the day open every window in the room for three minutes at least. That will freshen the room and give the lungs a good air bath. Don't be afraid of a little cold air.

It has come under my notice that many people never have a window open at night when they are sleeping. The air in that room in the morning is absolutely foul. A housekeeper took me through the rooms of a hotel one morning. Only about one-third of them had had a window open during the night. The stench of the tightly closed rooms was something awful. Some were reeking with tobacco smoke; others smelled of liquor; some full of the odor of perspiration.

People are gradually educated along these lines, and pretty soon they will wake up to the fact that fresh air is absolutely necessary for health. Wonderful results are being accomplished these days in the treatment of consumption by the fresh air cure. It is not always necessary to go to Arizona and California to get relief. Winter and summer find people who are suffering from tuberculosis staying out of doors—well wrapped up in winter, to be sure, in the cold states—but the cold air goes directly into the lungs, and it is said that tubercular germs cannot survive if the lungs are constantly filled with pure air. Of course, people who are very far along in consumption may not find a cure in fresh air or any kind of hygienic living, but in the first and middle stages tuberculosis can be cured by an outdoor life.

Living out of doors would be fine for us all, but as we are not fortunate enough to be able to do it, let us do the best we can and ventilate the room we are obliged to stay in and fill our lungs with fresh air every chance we get.

Conductors on street cars, policemen who spend most of their time on the streets, and farmers whose work keeps them out of doors about two-thirds of the time, are not always well by any means. It is true they get plenty of fresh air, but in other ways they do not live right. They eat improper food, or too much of it, do not chew their food well, are irregular in their sleeping, or in other habits, do not bathe enough and in a good many ways live out of harmony with nature's laws. In each case they would be worse off were it not for the fresh air they are getting.




