Tide of Battle Runs Back and Forth.

DIXMUDE STILL IN HANDS OF GERMANS

Teuton Attempt to Advance Beyond That Point Futile.

London, Nov. 15.—Battle follows in the great struggle in North-east France and Belgium, but notwithstanding the heroic efforts of both the allies and the Germans the military situation there apparently has undergone no noteworthy change in the last twenty-four hours.

official statement, fighting has recommenced with greater spirit and offensive movements by the Germans near Verdun have been checked.

Summing up the situation in the western area of the war a French general says: "We have recaptured a large part of the French territory which had been captured by the Germans."

Russians Advance in East. On the eastern battle ground the Russians continue to advance.

Petrograd advices assert the Russian occupation of Johannsburg, East Prussia, was a coup of strategic importance and add that between Johannsburg and Billa the Russians continue their advance.

MORE MEN FOR ENGLAND

Would Bring Total British Army to 2,186,400 by March 31.

London, Nov. 14.—A supplementary estimate to provide for another 1,000,000 men required by the British government during the year ending March 31 was introduced in the house of commons.

Lord Gordon-Lennox Killed. London, Nov. 14.—Lord Bernard Charles Gordon-Lennox, major in the Grenadier guards and the third son of the Duke of Richmond and Gordon, has been killed in battle.

GERMAN AVIATORS FLY OVER ENGLAND.

Berlin (by wireless to Sayville, L. I.), Nov. 14.—German aviators have flown over the English ports of Sheerness, in Kent, and Harwich, on the east coast, it was declared here, following advices by the war office.

RUSSIANS NEARING CRACOW

Petrograd Reports Austrian Emperor Has Appealed to Kaiser.

London, Nov. 16.—A Petrograd dispatch to the Post says: "Cracow is momentarily expecting the arrival of the Russian troops and the Austrian emperor has dispatched an appeal to the Germans to send reinforcements at all costs."

BIG BRITISH BATTLESHIP TORPEDOED

Superdreadnought Audacious Sunk.

MOST OF THE CREW SAVED BY OLYMPIC

White Star Liner Ten Miles Distant When Help Is Asked.

New York, Nov. 15.—Rumors of disaster to the British superdreadnought Audacious, which have persisted ever since the White Star liner Olympic, diverted from its course, arrived at Lough Swilly on Oct. 29, are confirmed in mail advices received from a point in Ireland.

After a career of less than two years, the Audacious, of the King George V. class—third in tonnage and armament of his majesty's warships—lies at the bottom of the ocean off the north coast of Ireland.

Decided List at Stern. By that time the battleship had a decided list at the stern, where just below the water line it had received its wound.

After taking off all the officers and crew who would leave the ship Captain Haddock of the Olympic turned his attention to an attempt to save the warship.

Meanwhile the bulkheads began to give way and it was soon apparent that it would be impossible to tow the ship or keep her afloat.

The flotilla of rescue ships continued to stand by, however, until 9 p. m. when a terrific explosion occurred on board and the Audacious plunged stern first and in a moment disappeared.

GERMAN SUBMARINE RAIDS ENGLISH PORT

Deal, Eng., Nov. 13.—Thousands of persons witnessed the sinking of Deal of the British torpedo gunboat Niger by a German submarine while lying in the Downs opposite the Pier head.

A loud roar of an explosion was heard, dense columns of black smoke were seen to arise and the Niger almost immediately began to go down by the bows.

LORD ROBERTS DIES SUDDENLY IN FRANCE

London, Nov. 16.—Field Marshal Earl Roberts died in France from pneumonia. A telegram from Field Marshal Sir John French, commander of the British expeditionary forces on the continent, apprised Earl Kitchener, secretary of state for war, of the death of England's great soldier.

London was stunned when the war bureau made public this news: "Bobs"—Lord Roberts—hero of the South African war and retired field marshal of the British forces, the military idol of the generation, expired in France, where he had gone, in spite of his eighty-two years, for one last look at Tommie Atkins and the Indian troops in action—for one last smell of gunpowder on the firing line.

Field Marshal Roberts suffered from a severe chill on Thursday and pneumonia rapidly developed. His great age greatly militated against his recovery.

The terrible dampness of the continental battlefield overwhelmed the aged veteran, who in younger days had withstood the scorching suns of India and the rigors of campaigning among the kopjes of South Africa.

CAPTAIN VON MULLER ALIVE

Commander of Cruiser Emden Now a British Prisoner.

London, Nov. 12.—Captain von Muller of the German cruiser Emden, which was attacked by the Australian cruiser Sydney and driven ashore in the Cocos Island, where it burned; and Prince Franz Joseph of Hohenzollern, one of his officers, are prisoners of war, and neither is wounded, according to an announcement by the admiralty.

The admiralty adds that the losses on the Emden are unofficially reported as 200 killed and thirty wounded.

The admiralty has given directions that all honors of war be accorded to the survivors of the Emden and that the captain and his officers are not to be deprived of their words.

ORDERS MANY SALOONS CLOSED

Special Agent of the Indian Department at Washington Busy in Northern Minnesota.

Acting for Cato Sells, federal commissioner of Indian affairs, Special Agent Henry A. Larson of the Indian department at Washington has issued an order at Bemidji that all saloons included in the territory affected by the Chippewa treaty of 1855 must close their doors by Nov. 30.

Action of the government, following the recent decision by the United States supreme court that the provisions prohibiting the sale of liquor under the treaty of 1855 are valid, first became known when Special Agent Larson and his deputies arrived here from a trip through the affected district.

By personal notification they told the saloonists that they must close their doors by the end of the month. While liquor interests at Bemidji and elsewhere in the affected district have held out hope that the government would not actually close the saloons, but would keep strict watch for law violations in regard to liquor sales to Indians, they anticipated the closing order after a conference of officials and Special Agent Larson when he arrived at Bemidji from Washington.

Seals Fate of Liquor District. When the government agent refused to state the nature of his trip to Northern Minnesota the impression prevailed that the fate of the liquor district had been sealed.

The order comes as the close of long arguments, hearings and speculation concerning the treaty of 1855, which is one of six dealing with Indian problems.

WEALTHY MAN ENDS LIFE

Millionaire Lumberman Kills Self in St. Paul Hotel.

William Sautrey, one time lumber king of the St. Croix river, shot and killed himself in a room at the Ryan hotel, St. Paul. His body was found by a bellboy.

Nothing to explain his act was left in the room or in his pockets by the former millionaire lumber and coal man.

No one heard the report of the revolver. The bullet entered the roof of Sautrey's mouth and passed directly through the brain.

Mr. Sautrey, who was sixty-one years old, arrived at Stillwater when twenty years old. He entered the lumber industry and for a time drove oxen in the lumber and logging camps.

In this industry he made the bulk of his money and at one time was rated at nearly \$2,000,000.

ONE MAN TAKEN OUT ALIVE

Entombed for Five Days in the Sibley Mine Near Ely.

AGREE TO ASSIST THE SOUTH

Twin City and Duluth Banks Join Cotton Pool.

The banks of St. Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth, subject to the approval of the boards of directors, will raise \$1,000,000 as part of the \$125,000,000 cotton pool.

After having twice refused to participate in the cotton pool the bankers considered the matter again on the urgent appeals of Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo and agreed to raise the \$1,000,000 asked.

The money will be subject to the call of the secretary of the treasury and cotton will be held for the money invested.

RAILWAY COMPANY FILES BIG MORTGAGE

A mortgage for \$500,000,000, executed by the Northern Pacific Railway company in favor of the Guaranty Trust company of New York, has been filed in the office of the register of deeds of Ramsey county at St. Paul.

The instrument is called a "refunding and improvement mortgage," and is dated July 1, 1914. It will mature July 1, 2047.

The mortgage conveys to the Guaranty Trust company and William S. Tod, trustee, all the railroads of the Northern Pacific system, all leaseholds, properties and franchises owned by the corporation, together with the assignment of stocks, bonds and other properties.

The mortgage will be held by the Guaranty Trust company and Tod as trustees as security for \$500,000,000 in 4 per cent gold bonds, to be issued by the Northern Pacific.

The mortgage will be filed in all states in which the railroad company has properties. The value of the real estate owned by the Northern Pacific in Minnesota is \$20,000,000. A registration tax of \$9,285 was paid into the state treasury.

BREWERS PROPOSE TO FIGHT

Object to General Application of the Indian "Lid."

If agents of the Indian department confine their activities in enforcing the Indian treaty lid of 1855 to such towns as Bemidji, Walker, Cass Lake, Bena and Club City it is likely they will meet with no opposition from the State Brewers' association and the Business Men's Treaty committee, of which Mayor Victor Power of Hibbing is chairman.

TWO KILLED IN AUTO WRECK

Minnesota Banker and Veteran Editor the Victims.

Dewitt C. Armstrong, president of the Albert Lea State bank, and Clint L. Luce, secretary of the Albert Lea Commercial club and a well known newspaper man of Southern Minnesota, were killed in an automobile accident while returning to Albert Lea from Lanesboro.

AMERICAN TROOPS TO QUIT VERA CRUZ

Washington, Nov. 15.—Confident that the Mexican people can work out their own destiny the administration is rushing preparations to end American occupation of Vera Cruz.

Even though the worst comes to the worst it is believed certain that one, or at the most two, general battles will decide which of the factions now essaying power is to control pending the restoration of real constitutional government.


It is because of the realization that presence of American troops in Mexico is an ever present source of irritation that American troops have been ordered to leave Vera Cruz by Nov. 23.




