


The Absentee

OBITUARY

MRS. ANDREW W. ANDERSON.
Relatives and friends in Willmar were grieved to hear of the death of Mrs. Lydia Regina Anderson (nee Paulson) which occurred at her home at 1201 Hague Avenue, St. Paul, last Thursday, November 12th, after an illness of almost a year with consumption. She has been confined to her bed since in May.

Mrs. Anderson was born on November 14th, 1875, at Willmar, Minnesota, and was the daughter of the late Rev. and Mrs. O. Paulson. At the age of ten years, together with her parents, moved to Blanchardville, Wis. She attended the high school at Ishpeming, Michigan, and at Rockford, Ill., and was a graduate from the Normal School at Plattville, Wis. She taught school for three years at Blanchardville. In 1898 she was united in marriage to Mr. Andrew W. Anderson of Madison, Wis., who was at that time, a young attorney. They made their home at Madison until in 1901 when they moved to St. Paul, where they have resided since.

She has always been active in church work. Lately she has taken an active part and shown great interest in the work of the "Lyngblomster" in St. Paul, an organization for the building and maintaining of a home for old people. In the spring of 1913 she was elected secretary of this organization and was re-elected to this office last spring.

Her beloved husband, Andrew W. Anderson, her widowed mother, Mrs. Ingger Paulson, three sisters, Mrs. Alphia Romsdahl of Calumet, Mich., Helga Paulson of St. Paul and Agot Paulson of Fargo, N. D.; three brothers, Martin Paulson of Evansville, Wis., Paul Paulson of Minneapolis and Olaf Paulson of Argyle, Wis., besides a large number of relatives and friends in this community, and the cities.

The funeral was held Saturday, November 14th, from the residence at 1:30 o'clock and from the English Lutheran church of Reformation at St. Paul at two o'clock. Rev. J. E. Lobeck officiated at the house and at the cemetery and Rev. A. Otfedal of Minneapolis officiated at the church. She was laid to rest in the Rose Lawn Cemetery of St. Paul. The pall bearers were John P. Anderson, James R. Anderson, Henry B. Lund, George Otfedal and P. W. Pederson. An octave from the Augsburg Seminary of Minneapolis sang a song at the church.

CERTIFICATE OF AMENDMENT TO CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION OF THE FORUM INVESTMENT COMPANY.

At a special meeting of the stockholders of the Forum Investment Company, a corporation, under the Laws of the State of Minnesota, which meeting was duly convened pursuant to Law, and at which meeting was present, either in person, or proxy, the owners of all capital stock of said corporation outstanding; the following resolutions were duly adopted by the affirmative vote of all the stockholders present:

Resolved, that Article Five of the Certificate of Incorporation of the Forum Investment Company be amended, by striking out the following: "Ten Thousand (\$10,000) of said shares shall be preferred stock, and Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000) shall be common stock. The holders of the preferred stock shall be entitled to receive from the surplus or net profits of the corporation, when and as declared by the Board of Directors, dividends at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum, payable annually at the annual meeting of said Corporation, in each year, beginning with the year 1912;" and also by striking out the words, "The holders of preferred stock shall have no vote, and such stock shall be non-cumulative," and to insert in their place, the words, "All capital stock of the Corporation shall be common stock, so that said Article as amended shall read as follows:

ARTICLE FIVE.
The amount of the capital stock of the Corporation shall be Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand (\$250,000.00) Dollars, which shall be paid in, in money or property, or both, in such manner, and at such time, and in such amount as the Board of Directors may determine, and inserting in their place, the words, "All capital stock of the Corporation shall be common stock, so that said Article as amended shall read as follows:

ARTICLE FIVE.
