Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Willmar that the salary of the Chief of the Willmar Fire Department and of the Assistant Chief, for the year of 1915, be and the same is hereby fixed at \$75.00 and \$50.00 respectively.

The following resolution, adopted by the Willmar Fire Department, as to the use of the Fire Hall, was presented and read.

"The Volunteer Firemen of Willmar in joint meeting assembled this 18th day of January, 1915, respectfully ask your Honorable body in the future to prohibit the use of the Fire Apparatus Room for the exhibit of stock, poultry shows or other exhibits, as we believe that it was not the intention of the taxpayers that the building was to be used for such purposes, at least it is not the views of this Fire Department."

The aforesaid was approved by the Council and ordered placed on file.  
An application from Nichols-Hicks-McNairy Co., City, for license to sell cigarettes was presented and read, and the same was, on motion, granted, subject to the conditions of the State Law.

The City Treasurer's quarterly report was presented and read and the same was referred to the City Auditor.  
Requisitions for supplies from the Water & Light Department were presented and the Clerk was, on motion, instructed to order same.

Alderman Johnson presented an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance fixing the remuneration to be paid to the regular and active members of the Willmar Volunteer Fire Companies and establishing rules therefor."  
Moved and seconded that the aforesaid ordinance be considered and given its first reading. Carried.
