**SCANIAN GUILD CELEBRATES**  
Washington's Birthday Made Occasion for Big Gathering of Skánings in Costume.

The Scanian Guild, (Skánings-gille) of the northwest, celebrated Washington's Birthday at the Odin Club at Minneapolis last Monday night. Two hundred guests arrayed in cocked hats and Martha Washington bonnets of the Colonial period were present. Warrant for the belief of Washington's Scandinavian extraction is found in an address which he delivered at a farewell reception given by the Societas Scandinaviensis (still in existence) to Count Axel Fersen, an officer who had served in the revolutionary war, in the city tavern, Philadelphia, Dec. 11, 1782. There Washington said he had descended from the family of "Wasa", whose members emigrated from Scania in 970, settling in County Durham, England.

The part that early Swedish colonists and their descendants took in the Revolutionary War is far greater than is generally known. The surprise party which overwhelmed the Hessians near Trenton was composed largely of such. The early New Sweden colony is usually given very scant notice in our school histories. For instance, the Swedes had arrived and dealt amicably with the Delaware Indians before William Penn arrived to treat with them. Swedish missionaries reduced the Indian language to a written one, had printed catechisms, and taught the Indian children to read. Dr. Amandus Johnson, of the University of Pennsylvania, is rendering valuable service in bringing to light early history of Colonial times.
