A. O. FORSBERG TO POSTMASTER

Since Monday A. O. Forsberg has been receiving the congratulations from his friends, it having leaked out that the Willmar postmaster had been decided in his favor. National Committeeman Fred B. Lynch of St. Paul has made the necessary recommendations to President Wilson and the Post-office Department. Mr. Forsberg received one of the preliminary blanks from the Postmaster General to be filled out last week, and it is regarded only a matter of a short time until the appointment will be announced. As Congress is not in session the appointment when made will be subject to confirmation by the Senate when it convenes next winter. The Willmar post-office pays a salary of \$2,400 per year. The other applicants were S. E. Stansberry, the well-known Willmar implement man, and D. W. McLaughlin, a railroad mail clerk.

The news of the appointment will be received with much satisfaction by the patrons of the office, as well by the people generally of the county, inasmuch as among whom Mr. Forsberg enjoys a wide acquaintance. The administration picked a deserving man and will receive due credit for its action from among the rank and file of the people.

Would Define "County Fair"

Representative Theodore Christenson of Lac Qui Parle county has introduced a bill to limit state aid to county fairs to such fairs only as have their own grounds properly fenced in and complying with certain requirements. This would tend to improve county fairs. Land prices in Minnesota are going up and county fair associations who buy their own grounds now while prices are low will be on an easy street as compared to those who wait until they have to buy land when prices have doubled. With their own grounds for fair uses, the counties will take more pride in their county fairs and the permanency of it will be assured. If a county fair is worth having at all, it should be made the most of. Some of the best agriculturists in the state favor the Christenson county fair bill and are looking for its passage.

COUNTY OPTION PRELIMINARY CONFERENCE FRIDAY P. M.

Meeting For Purpose of Determining Time for Filing Petitions and Holding County Convention.

Over eleven hundred citizens have signed the petitions for a county option election and the number is growing. There are yet many localities where the people have not had a chance to sign. These petitions have been circulated informally and no central organization has yet been formed. Before the filing of the petitions, which act will to a large extent determine the time for the election, it is proper that some organization be effected to discuss and determine matters of interest to the movement.

A meeting of those interested is therefore called to meet at the Commercial Club rooms at Willmar next Saturday afternoon, April 17, at 1:30 o'clock, to make a preliminary organization, set a time for filing of petitions and consider the calling of a general county convention. In order to give the issue the proper impetus before the election it is thought by some that a general conference with delegates from all precincts and from different organizations be held. This matter will be discussed next Saturday afternoon. In the meantime those having blank petitions should give every voter possible a chance to sign. The combined petitions will make a document of historic interest and all who wish should be given the privilege of appearing on same. Be on hand Saturday afternoon to help make preliminary plans.

The U. Costa Big Money.

A paper was shown us the other day by John Casey of Darwin containing a list of the employes and instructors at the state university and agricultural school, with the salaries paid. To begin with, the executive department requires about 140 people, and the entire force including professors, assistants and other help, totals 1415 employes, whose aggregate monthly salaries are \$116,784.65, or for a year over \$1,400,000.00. This is for salaries alone, the total expense of this big institution of learning being much more. A part of this is paid by the students, but a considerable part is raised by general taxation.—Litchfield Independent.
