

COURT FINES UNION BREWING CO. \$2,800.
Big Concern Pleads Guilty To 28 Counts in Federal Court at Peoria.

Fines totalling \$2,800 and costs were imposed on the Union Brewing Co. in the United States federal court this morning when the brewing company pleaded guilty of 28 counts. Indictments brought against the concern by the last federal grand jury charged it with falsely billing goods for railroad transport. According to the indictments bills of lading wrongly described goods shipped from the brewery. Apparently the brewery had made all preparations to fight the case, and its sudden appearance in court with a plea of guilty this morning was entirely unexpected. It was fined \$100 on each count, the total penalty being well over \$3,000.—Peoria Journal, Apr. 30.

FIGHT CHOLERA.
Meeker County Farmers Unite to Drive Out Dread Disease During Summer Months.
If every county in the United States had as effective an organization to drive out hog cholera as Meeker County, Minnesota, has just formed, there would be few hogs lost this year. Farmers in Meeker County are determined to wipe out the disease. The Meeker County Swine Breeders' Association, as it is called, has 100 charter members. It is incorporated. There is a president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer, and board of directors in charge. It is much similar to the Renville County organization formed last year by the United States Department of Agriculture to fight the cholera.

The township is the unit of organization. There is to be a local organization in each township, a membership of ten or more persons entitling a township to a directorship upon the county board. Central headquarters are at Litchfield. An effective campaign is to be conducted in each township to obtain members. Each director is to be aided by an assistant secretary, the two men acting as a committee to see that the town board enforces the quarantine laws. The two will insist not only upon strict quarantine of sick hogs but the burial or burning of dead hogs to prevent birds or animals from spreading the disease. The initial membership fee is \$2 and the dues 50 cents a year. The money is to be expended by Secretary-Treasurer G. A. Amidon, teacher of agriculture at Litchfield, to keep serum on hand and pay the expenses of the organization. About 10,000 cubic centimeters of serum will be ready for use at any time.




