SHALL WE HAVE A SAFE AND SANE FOURTH?

But a Short Time Until Nation's Birthday Will Be Celebrated Again.

Fourth of July will be with us in a few weeks. What is your community doing to make it a "Glorious Fourth" in reality, instead of a fatal Fourth, which it has been to thousands of the youth of the land in the last few years?

These are the pertinent questions by R. W. Hargadine, Minnesota state fire marshal, who is making an effort to bring home to the people a realization of the enormous fire loss and danger that follows in the wake of the holiday as generally observed.

This year it is more important than usual to take extra precautions against the usual results of Independence day celebrations, because the holiday falls on Sunday, thereby increasing the danger of fire because of the suspension of business for two days.

Independence day is one of powder poisoning and lockjaw; day of hostilities and ambulances; day of mutilation, fire and death.

Fourth of July can be made "safe and sane". If there is anything that is sane in the American people it is the growing revolt against our insane manner of celebrating this holiday.

Every man upon whose shoulders fall public responsibility dreads it. No fire department gets through the day and nights on both sides of it without exhaustion and it is doubtful if on some fifth of July an entire community may not burn itself up in the faces of firemen and fire exhausts or be exhausted by silly freeracker fires the day before to cope with it.

And even while the men and horses are doing their utmost to reach a fire caused by some careless or thoughtless person there have been cases where both men and horses were killed by being thrown from trucks by frightened horses swerving from explosives thrown at them as they galloped past.

Aside from the financial loss, by far the most distressing results of the celebration is the loss of life and limb. Thousands of young men are going through life sightless or crippled and made dependent upon charity because of explosives on Independence day.

With all these facts in mind the state fire marshal seeks to arouse in the minds of the people of Minnesota the necessity of observing the ordinance and state laws in relation to the sale of explosives and urges all the people to begin now to prepare to make Fourth of July this year in Minnesota the beginning of a new era in the observance of Independence day.

Mr. Hargadine realizing the necessity of taking some practical step toward eliminating the usual dangerous form of patriotic celebration is sending out (or will send out shortly), a letter to each of the mayors and fire chiefs in the different municipalities of the state with a copy of a model ordinance and the suggestion that it be introduced in the various councils and to urge its passage.
