

ACCIDENT IN DOVRE HAS FATAL RESULT

Hildus Estnes, Young Farmer Succumbs to Injuries Sustained.

The injuries sustained by Hildus Estnes on Sunday, July 18, proved fatal, and he passed away Friday at the Willmar hospital.

Much has been taken from this wife and little ones, from sister and brothers, and the large circle of relatives and friends; sweet ties have been severed, but much is left. The Christian's hope and fadeless memories are still theirs.

hild Theodora, one year old, survive with their grief-stricken mother, although too young to grasp, as she does, the tragedy which has bereaved them. They have the profound sym-

pathy of all in their hour of deep trouble. The deceased is also mourned by a brother, William Estnes, of this city, a sister, Miss Thora Estnes of Portland, Ore., and two sisters and three brothers in Norway. His parents are both dead. The deceased was born at Fettsund, near Christiania, Norway, June 2, 1881. He arrived in America in Jan. 1904. He attended the Parkland Lutheran Academy at Parkland, Wash., and was employed for several years as bookkeeper for a manufacturing concern at Everett, Wash. Six years ago he began farming operations, the two first years on the Schodung place and the last four on the Rykken farm.

The funeral was held Monday. Services were conducted at the late residence. Rev. E. O. Larson spoke on Ps. 55:23, Rev. M. B. Michaelson used I. Sam. 20:3 as his text, and Rev. E. G. Gynild based some remarks on Ps. 62, 1st verse. The funeral march was played by Miss Sigrid Gynild. A solo was sung by Ingvald Rykken, and a selection by a quartette of Rykken brothers. The pall bearers were Albert, Ingvald, Thorwald, Ludvig and Obed Rykken and Gustaf Hegstrom. The interment took place at the Eagle Lake church cemetery. There was a profusion of floral tributes. A large number from sympathizing friends aside from relatives. The Dovre Young People's Society contributed a beautiful wreath.

OFFICES SHIFTED BACK TO SIOUX CITY

Great Northern Makes Another Shift of Employees—McKinnon Leaves.

Last winter the Great Northern railroad abolished the dispatchers of office at Sioux City and moved the train dispatchers to this city, thus making this the headquarters for two divisions. With the coming of fall, and the consequent increase in business on the road, it has become evident that better results may be obtained under the old system. Consequently the offices at Sioux City have been re-established, the change to take effect the first of the month. Under the new order W. E. Richards, who has been acting as night chief here, returns to Sioux City as chief dispatcher, and Messrs. McCune, Devorell and Bailey return as trick dispatchers. The clerical force will also move their headquarters to the old stand.

Under the new arrangement J. A. McKinnon, who has been superintendent of the Willmar division for several years, goes to Sioux City, as superintendent. P. F. Keating of Breckenridge, who has held a like position with headquarters at that place will come to Willmar as superintendent, and E. C. Huffman of Sioux City goes to Breckenridge in the same capacity. These men leave to take up their work in their new locations on Saturday.

Mr. Keating, who comes here from Breckenridge as superintendent, was, at one time, a brakeman, with headquarters in this city.
