OBITUARY

DANIEL McCORMON.
The death of an old resident of Harrison occurred last Friday, when Daniel McCrimmon passed away from the scenes of this life, after a three months' illness from pneumonia.
Daniel McCrimmon was born in Glenelg, Iverness Shire, Scotland, Oct. 20, 1844. He came to Canada with the family when a boy of nine years, and grew to manhood there. He came to Saginaw, Mich., where he lived for some time before going to Minneapolis. In the latter city he made his headquarters for a number of years while working in saw mills and planeries of northern Minnesota. He came to Harrison township in 1872, locating on the farm that has since been his home. He was married to Christina Ross Nov. 30, 1881. His wife died June 17, 1890. Two sons survive their father—Norman, who lives on the home farm; and Thomas, of Wheaton. A daughter, Mary, died in 1906. The deceased is also mourned by a brother, Fred McCrimmon of Seattle, Wash.; and four sisters—Mrs. Hugh McRae of Harrison; Mrs. Rodrick Cameron of Kenyon; Mrs. Miss Sara McCrimmon of Pentticut; B. C. Miss Manda McCrimmon of Seattle, Wash.; and a number of nephews and nieces. The deceased was a faithful member of the First Presbyterian church, which he served in the capacity of elder, a member of the Kandiyohi County Old Settlers' Association, and was highly esteemed by all neighbors and others who knew him.
The funeral occurred Monday. Services were conducted at the church and the interment took place at Oakside cemetery. Rev. Herbert Taylor officiating. The pall-bearers were Messrs. J. H. Martin, Henry Horne, Christ Pagel, Henry Stone, Elmer Halvorson and J. D. Henderson.

ANDERS D. HAIN.

Anders D. Hain died at the Bethesda Homes Tuesday, July 13th.
