BOY ACCIDENTLY SHOT TUESDAY

Eleven Year Old Son of Hugh McGregor Meets With Accident. Careless handling of firearms by young boys nearly resulted in a fatal accident Tuesday afternoon, when Arthur McGregor, eleven years of age, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh McGregor of this city, was accidentally shot. Young McGregor, together with three or four of his boy friends went out to the slaughter house to shoot rats, taking with them a 22 calibre rifle. The exact cause of the accident had not been ascertained when this was written, as the injured boy was unable to talk without hurting his side. One story has it that passing a bunch of cattle, one of the boys struck a cow with the stock of the gun, and in so doing the rifle was accidentally discharged. The bullet entered McGregor's chest, on the right side, and followed the ribs around to the back. Immediately after the shooting an auto was called from town north, and the boy rushed to the Willmar hospital. He was conscious all of the time. An X-Ray photograph was taken and the bullet located in the boy's back. It was immediately removed by Dr. Branton, and, at this writing the boy is resting comfortably, and unless complications set in, his recovery will be a speedy one. —John N.
