COUNTY BOARD SPECIAL SESSION
Official Proceedings of County Commissioners of Kandiyohi County.

State of Minnesota, ss. County of Kandiyohi, ss. County Auditor's Office, Willmar, Minnesota, Sept. 9, 1915.

In the matter of County Ditches No. 32 and 34 of said county.

The Board of County Commissioners of Kandiyohi County met at the County Auditor's office in the City of Willmar on above date pursuant to call. All the members of said board, namely, N. B. Johnson, S. A. Syverson, N. B. Johnson, C. J. Swenson and Albert Boersma, were present and meeting called to order by the chairman.

The Board adjourned to the Court Room in the court house and there re-convened.

The County Attorney appeared for the Board of County Commissioners. Mr. D. Barnard appeared for the petitioners and Mr. T. O. Gilbert, Esq., appeared for the petitioners.

Petitioners Nanko Vos and others for a public ditch (county) in the towns of Roseland, Holland and Whitefield was presented and publicly read. Proof of posting, mailing, serving and publication of notices in the manner were examined and interested parties heard relative to the matter. Motion carried that hearing be closed and adjourn to the Commissioners' room, where the board immediately re-convened.

Motion made and carried that action be deferred till 10 o'clock a. m., September 16th, 1915.

MAN MURDERED AT CLARA CITY
An Unknown Man Shot to Death in a Box Car Tuesday Night. Another Badly Wounded.

An unknown man was shot to death in an empty box car which stood near the Farmers' Elevator Tuesday night and instantly killed. After the deed was committed his assailants escaped in the darkness and so far have not been captured.

A transient by the name of Richard Bielek who had arrived from Abbotsford, Wis., the day before was sleeping in the box car at the time and was aroused when someone tried to pull his shoes off and was searching his clothes. The robbers hit him over the head, or at least this is the story he tells, but in the scuffle he managed to get out of the car and in doing so sustained a badly wrenched ankle. His cries awoke C. H. Strong in the Commercial Hotel and he got up and gave the alarm. This happened about 11:30.

When Strong and others appeared on the scene, Bielek had dragged himself away from the box car and was all bloody covered with wounds. He and his assailants and he told them what had happened. The marshall and others went back to the box car and there discovered a dead man who had just expired. A bullet from a 32 calibre revolver had entered above the right eye and had gone out back of his head instantly. A loaded 32 calibre revolver was found on the side of his body and the corner of his coat thrown over it. A bag of cartridges, flashlight, skeleton key and a song book of the I. W. W. was found on his person but no money and nothing whatever as to his identification.

The dead man appeared to be about forty years old, clean shaven and no marks of any kind on his body. He had an abnormal large head and in appearance looked like a criminal or convict. The theory advanced, and if Bielek's story is true, that the dead man with his pals came in the car to rob Bielek and in the general scuffle the dead man was shot by one of his own companions. Bielek had \$2.40 on his person which the robbers failed to take. He was taken to the county hospital where his wounds were dressed and a hunt begun for the robbers. The night trains were watched but no strange characters got on. The robbers either went north or south. Willmar and other near by towns were not notified till the next morning and by this time the robbers were perhaps miles away.

The sheriff, county attorney and coroner Smith came over in the forenoon and collected what evidence they could. An inquest was held and the verdict of the jury was that the deceased was killed by parties unknown. The dead man was taken to the undertaking establishment of the Clara City Mercantile Co. and there dressed for burial. He was buried the same day in the potter's field. Before his burial a picture was taken of his features and this will be sent to the gallery where it is hoped it may be identified. Sheriff Borgendale thinks he has seen the man before but is not sure. Bielek was released.—Clara City Herald.

LUCE LINE WILL MAKE A SPURT
Will Reach Hutchinson and Perhaps Cedar Mills Before End of Present Year.

All doubt as to the plans of the Luce Line so far as Hutchinson is concerned has been dispelled. Luce Line cars will be running into Hutchinson, giving the city its third railway, before January 1, next at the latest—probably within two months.

The Leader speaks by the card when it says that grading will be completed between Silver Lake and Winsted within two weeks and within three weeks the work of laying rails from Winsted towards Hutchinson will be well under way.

Weather alone may interfere with this work, for all of which the contract is let. As fast as grading work is finished from Winsted to Hutchinson the crews will be shifted west of Hutchinson and possibly the Meeker county (Cedar Mills, township) line will be crossed this year. The line through Acoma runs a short distance northeast of the store. Ten elevating graders, 175 horses and 60 men distributed among five camps are hustling operations on the Silver Lake line.

Hutchinson is throbbing enjoyably with excitement incidental to a railroad building in. Balduz Bros., and H. F. Winter have their camp located on the Hans Jensen farm across the river east from the city and it is a model camp of seven tents with cooks, sleeping equipments, kitchen, stables, etc. The outfit came in on the G. N. Ry. on ten cars. The steam shovel which will claw the dirt out of an 13 foot cut east of the city is being unloaded at the east end of the Great Northern bridge and from there will get to the right of way half a mile on a temporary track of its own.

The Luce Line depot site in Hutchinson is ideal. The lot across the street from the mill has been purchased of H. H. Ames, the railroad to cross Main street at grade level. The German Baptist church and parsonage and possibly the Thos. Pitts residence will have to move to make way for the new railway.

Besides the big steam shovel Balduz Bros. and Winter will employ 10 horses and 54 men on their three mile contract east from Hutchinson city. The Messrs. Luce will submit to the county board a proposition for putting in a joint center and right of way at the north end of Wither Lake. The board has already let the contract for building a road way to Jens Juul at \$8,000, but as it will be paralleled by the Luce Line tracks it would seem to be practical that the two be made one piece of architecture.

In passing it may be said that Hutchinson welcomes the Luce Line. Its coming spells added growth, progress and population for the city. And in completing the line here the Messrs. Luce father and son, keep to the letter the pledge they gave our citizens.—Hutchinson Leader.
