INJURED AT MORRIS.
John D. Murray, aged 37 and a resident of Seattle, Wash., is an inmate of the Morris hospital today suffering the loss of his left leg and several toes from the right foot. He was ground beneath a locomotive in the Great Northern yards in this city about eight o'clock Wednesday evening.
According to his story he attempted to cross the tracks at the Seventh street crossing when he was hit by an approaching engine which he failed to notice. He was carried about a hundred feet when he rolled under the wheels and his left foot and leg were ground into a pulp. Assistance arrived immediately and he was taken to the hospital where Drs. Fitzgerald and Leuty performed an amputation at the joint of the knee. Four toes on the right foot were also removed. Dr. Johnson, who was one of the first who hastened to the assistance of the injured man, administered the anaesthetics.
Murray is a stranger in Morris. He says his relatives live at Seattle and they have been notified of his plight. He appears to be a man of some refinement and says he was in Morris looking for work in the harvest fields. —Morris Tribune.
