HOLDUP ARTISTS AT WORK IN CHIPPEWA COUNTY

Garage Keeper at Clara City Held Up and Robbed Last Thursday Evening. One Man in Hospital.

Two fellows from Willmar went to Clara City last Thursday night, hired an auto to go to Montevideo, and held up and robbed the driver. Later one was found unconscious under the overturned machine and the other had disappeared.

Two men who said that they hailed from Willmar and gave their names as Joe Ruff and Joe Morgan came late in the evening to the Commercial Hotel and asked for the garage keeper, Charles Schlegel, who had retired. He was awakened and the men dickered with him to take them to Montevideo. When about 9 miles out, the passengers pulled their guns on Mr. Schlegel and relieved him of \$10.50 in cash and his watch. Then they compelled him to teach them how to run the auto. The driver then then took to walk and the holdup men started towards Montevideo. Mr. Schlegel went to the nearest farm house but it had no phone. Eventually he came back on the road and presently came to where his auto was lying overturned by the roadside with Mr. Morgan pinned under the machine and in an unconscious condition. Mr. Schlegel finally secured telephone connections with Montevideo and Sheriff Ole Borgendale came out and took the injured man to the hospital. It appeared that the injured man had been robbed by his companion before the latter disappeared as Morgan was minus his gun and valuables.

Efforts to apprehend Ruff were made with no immediate success. He made his way to Maynard and secured an auto there to take him to the Milwaukee line. Mr. Morgan, who has been breaking out of Willmar and is supposed to live at Benson, was unconscious up to Sunday, since when we have no reports.

CHILD KILLED IN GUN ACCIDENT

Two Year Old Son of Mr. and Mrs. Crommett Living Near Spicer Killed Monday Afternoon.

A sad accident occurred at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin D. Crommett, residing near Spicer, Monday afternoon at about 3:30 o'clock, when Daniel Archie, two years and three months old, was shot through the head and instantly killed. The little fellow and a brother, four years of age, were alone in the home at the time of the accident. The shotgun stood in the corner, but how the accident happened is not clear. The children must have played with the gun, and caused it to be discharged. The fatal wound seemed to have struck the boy from above. Coroner Branton shortly afterwards but the case was so plainly an accident that no inquest was necessary. The accident is another warning of the danger of leaving a loaded gun about the house.
