NOTICE TO MILK MEN.
After January 1st, 1916, all persons selling and delivering milk or cream to private families, hotels, stores and eating houses in the city of Willmar must do so in glass bottles with paper caps.
The bottles must be put in wooden boxes with covers and said covers to have a hinge and clasp so as to keep the dirt and dust from the roads and streets from collecting on the bottles.
This rule applies especially to those delivering milk from autos, open bugles and wagons.
