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

**SAFFORD'S STATEMENT.**  
On page four we publish Mr. Calderwood's statement regarding the disadvantages of attempting to secure prohibition by constitutional amendment. The following statement by Geo. B. Safford gives the other side of the case:  
"Anti-Saloon League has received from the Woman's Christian Temperance Union a proposal that the temperance forces unite in making State-wide Prohibition by Constitutional Amendment the advance issue in the coming Legislative campaign. We understand a duplicate of this proposal has been sent also to the officials of the Prohibition Party.  
"On October 28, the Anti-Saloon League gave out a statement to the effect that it was willing to support either Constitutional or Statutory Prohibition, in order that it might throw no obstacle in the way of real union of the temperance forces. But we felt then and still feel that while union is very desirable, it would be disastrous for the temperance forces to unite behind the wrong issue. Believing that the time would come when it would be necessary to choose definitely between Statutory and Constitutional Prohibition as the campaign issue, we have since then taken steps to ascertain public opinion upon this question throughout the State and find that sentiment is very largely in favor of the Constitutional Amendment, chiefly because of its permanent character and because it refers the matter directly to the people for their ultimate decision.  
"We were impressed particularly with the importance of ascertaining the sentiment of the dry Senators on this question. The Senators, being elected for a four-year term, hold over for the next session and are practically in a position to determine the fate of this measure. We therefore addressed an impartial letter to all those who voted for the County Option bill, asking them to state their position. A large number replied, most of them at some length, giving friendly counsel and clear-cut opinions. Only two of the entire number expressed themselves definitely in favor of Statutory Prohibition. Two others said they were willing to vote for either without preference. Some were non-committal, but twenty expressed their definite conviction that the temperance forces should unite in asking for State-wide Prohibition by Constitutional Amendment. This heavy majority leaves no doubt as to where these Senators stand on this question.  
"Recognizing their pivotal position, the Anti-Saloon League feels that it cannot wisely place itself in opposition to their expressed judgment. For the above reasons we will gladly cooperate with the Woman's Christian Temperance Union in making State-wide Prohibition by Constitutional Amendment the issue in the coming Legislative campaign, and trust that the Third Party Prohibitionists will see their way clear to do the same."
