Help Save the Game Birds. An unusually heavy blanket of snow covers the woods and fields of Minnesota, varying in depth from over three feet in the northern part of the state to lesser depths in the southern portions. This condition will probably continue for six to eight weeks longer and presents a dangerous condition as affecting game birds, particularly quail. Corn fields, weed thickets and other sources of food supply are being buried under the drifts and starvation may be the fate of many birds, though such an impending disaster may in a large measure be averted by searching out the location of berries of quail and placing food for them in accessible and sheltered places and in improving natural shelters. Even prairie chickens may suffer starvation from the same cause, though not in the same degree as the quail as the latter are less hardy and less able to care for themselves and cope with rigorous weather conditions. Chinese pheasants, a few of which are established in certain localities, require attention and care. Ruffed grouse, on account of protection afforded by the forests and their habits, are best able to cope with such weather and are probably in no serious danger from this cause. Game wardens have been instructed to give as much attention as possible to this situation during the next few weeks. They are instructed to search out the location of quail and prairie chickens and endeavor to interest people in the vicinity in feeding and caring for them if they require it. When not possible to secure the co-operation of farmers and others they are authorized to secure and place suitable food in accessible places for the birds and to incur such necessary expense as is incident to this work. Other agencies are well suited to this purpose and the sweepings from barns containing a variety of seeds of weeds and grasses are excellent if properly distributed and placed. Wheat, oats, barley and buckwheat may be scattered in loose straw. The lives of many of our winter insectivorous birds may also be saved by erecting feeding stations and bird lynch counters and keeping them supplied with seeds, meat scraps, suet, etc. The interest and co-operation of individuals, bird clubs, sportsmen's clubs, farmers' clubs, editors, schools and other agencies is earnestly solicited, as it is better to try to save the birds we now have rather than face the necessity of attempting to re-stock depleted covers, particularly in view of the fact that wild game birds are becoming unobtainable anywhere for purposes of propagation owing to non-expert state laws. Probable continuation of the present weather conditions for some time render this situation a most worthy attention and interest of all.
