THE NEW PRIMARY BALLOT.

The primary preference ballots are published on pages two and seven. This is the first time these ballots are used, but there is nothing intricate about voting them. Call for the party ballot you want, mark your choice for president and then select the designated number of delegates to the national convention whom you desire to have represent you.

THE DEMOCRATIC BALLOT.

The next national Democratic convention will be one of the most important gatherings in the history of the United States. If true democracy is to remain in the ascendancy the people must send delegates that will stand against the insidious influences of special interests now so potent at work. The Democratic ballot has but one choice for president, but there is a chance to select delegates that may mean much in determining the course of events in this country. The organization candidates recommended by the conference for delegates at large are W. A. Just, B. F. Nelson, Dan W. Lawler and Anton C. Weiss. The other candidates for delegates are C. M. King, Julius J. Reiter, Henry F. West and Z. H. Austin. The candidates for the two seventh district delegates are Thomas M. Thayer of Herman, C. L. Kane of Benson and E. C. Hawkins of Granite Falls, the two first named being recommended by the conference. West, Austin, King and Reiter would make a good quartet to select for the delegates at large, aside or above any mere personal considerations.

Eric L. Thornton of Benson and Sam Lewison of Canby seem to be the favorite Cummins delegates from the Seventh District in local circles. Ex-Senator L. O. Thorpe of Willmar and Hon. Magnus Johnson of Meeker county both withdraw in favor of Thornton. Mr. Lewison of the southern part of the district has the endorsement of such men as Gunnar Bjornson and Theo. Christianson. Cummins has about as much show to get the G. O. P. nomination as a snow man has to survive thru August, but he will get many votes in Minnesota.

Bob Dunn, Granny Pease, et al., have received a telegram from Frank B. Kellogg that he will take them at their word and permit them to elect him to the U. S. Senate from Minnesota. How naughty of him to thus easily disprove how unwarranted is the criticism of the primary that it has driven the "best men" from public life.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Council Chambers, City Hall Building, Willmar, Minn., Feb. 23, 1916. Regular meeting of the City Council with Mayor Wellin in the chair. The following members of the Council were present on roll call: Mayor Wellin, Aldermen Johnson, Kent, Martin, Sperry, Erickson and Norman, 7; absent, none. City Attorney Stanford was also present.

The minutes of the last regular meeting held January 24, 1916, were read and the same were approved. (No meeting of the Council was held on the first meeting night of this month.)

The following bills were, on motion, referred to the Finance Committee: GENERAL FUND.

for poor ... 15.00 The Finance Committee reported that the foregoing bills back approved and their report was accepted.

RESOLUTION. Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Willmar that the City Clerk be, and he hereby is, authorized to issue warrants against the respective funds in payment of the foregoing approved bills.

Approved February 23, 1916. E. C. WELLIN, Mayor. George Matkila appealed and applied for permit to peddle ice cream from wagon. He was informed that such business would come under the Peddler's Ordinance.

Application of Jorstad Brothers for selling cigarettes in their confectionery store at No. 430 Benson Avenue West was presented. Moved and seconded that the aforesaid pool hall license be not granted. Carried.

M. C. Lewis made application for a sewer permit to connect new residence on west part Lot 3, Block 138, Second Addition with the Ella Avenue sewer. The said application was, on motion granted subject to the sewer regulations, but no tapping fee to be charged as said lot having been assessed for the construction of said sewer.

A petition from Otto Johnson was presented, asking that the following described tract of land abutting upon the East boundary line of the corporate limits of the City be annexed to the City of Willmar, to-wit:

That part of the South half of the Southwest quarter (S1-2 of S7-1-4) of Section Twelve (12), Township One Hundred Nineteen (119), Range Thirty-five (35), more particularly described as follows, to-wit: Commencing at a point at the Southwest corner of the Southwest quarter of said Section Twelve (12), Township One Hundred Nineteen (119), Range Thirty-five (35), thence running east One Hundred Sixty (160) rods, thence running north on the North and South quarter line to the right of way of the St. Paul, Minneapolis and Manitoba Railway (now Great Northern Railway), thence running in a Southwesterly course along said right of way to the West line of said Section Twelve (12) to a point, thence running South to the place of beginning, according to the United States Government survey thereof and containing Forty-one (41) acres, be the same more or less.

The said petition was ordered placed on file. Alderman Erickson introduced an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Annexing Certain Territory To the City of Willmar and Declaring the Same to be an Addition to said City."

Moved and seconded that the aforesaid ordinance be considered and given its first reading. Carried.

The said ordinance was then read. The following resolution, adopted by the Water and Light Commission was presented for approval by the Council.

RESOLUTION. "Resolved that the present water main be tapped at the intersection of Becker Avenue and Bernard street, that a gate valve be installed at said point and that a four inch water main be extended and laid from said point of tapping, east along said Becker Avenue to the intersection of Becker Avenue and Charlotte Street and Trott Avenue and there terminating, at which point a blow out valve for flushing the water main shall be installed, as per specifications.

Resolved further, that said four inch water main be also extended and laid from the said intersection of Becker Avenue and Charlotte St. E. along said Becker Avenue and Anthony Street and thence north along said Anthony Street to a point opposite the alley between Blocks 4 and 7 in Ferring's Addition to the City of Willmar and there terminating, at which point a fire hydrant shall be established.

Resolved further, that the water main at the intersection of Monongalia Avenue and Fourth Street East be tapped, at which point of tapping a gate valve shall be installed, and that a four inch water main be extended and laid from said point of tapping, south along Fourth Street east to the intersection of Fourth Street East and Augusta Avenue and there terminating at which point of termination a fire hydrant shall be established.

Resolved further, that the water main at the intersection of Minnesota Avenue and Second Street West be tapped and that a four inch water main be extended and laid from said point of tapping, south along said Second Street West to the intersection of said Second Street West and Rice Avenue and there terminating, at which point a blow out valve for flushing the water main shall be installed, as per specifications.

Resolved further, that the water main be tapped at the intersection of Fifth Street and Grace Avenue; that a gate valve be installed at said point, and that a four inch water main be extended and laid from said point of tapping, south along Fourth Street west to the intersection of Fourth Street West and Rice Avenue and there terminating, at which point a blow out valve for flushing the water main shall be installed, as per specifications.

A motion was made and seconded that the aforesaid resolution, adopted by the Water and Light Commission ordering water main extensions be approved. Carried.

The Clerk was, on motion, instructed to advertise for bids for water main extensions to be received at meeting to be held March 27, 1916.

It was ordered that advertise for bids for the grading of West Trott Avenue, between Eleventh and Fifteenth Streets, and part of Fifteenth Street, and Ann Street in Ferring's Addition, carried over to next fall. Such bids to be received at meeting to be held March 27, 1916.

The matter of appointing a Building Inspector, pursuant to Ordinance recently adopted, was taken up. O. A. Norman was named in nomination for said office and on ballot being taken received the full vote of the Council, 6 in all, and was declared duly elected to said office.

Oscar Fridlund was, on motion, appointed Deputy Building Inspector, pursuant to the new Building Ordinance. The City Treasurer's quarterly report for quarter ending December 31, 1916, was presented and the same was, on motion, referred to the City Auditor.
