

OBITUARY

PHILIP OTOS.

A very sad death that shocked the community was the passing of Philip, the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Otos, who resides at the fairground park. Philip attended school Thursday, and wanted to go Friday, but was not feeling well and was kept at home. His case developed into pneumonia and at 7:45 o'clock Monday morning the spirit passed away.

August Philip Otos was born at Willmar Aug. 3, 1899. He was a member of the Synod church confirmation class of 1913. He was a member of this year's Freshman class at the Willmar high school.

He was until lately an attendant at his uncle's barber shop on Saturdays and vacation time, where many who otherwise might not have met him, learned to know and like him. He was a good and willing boy and a dutiful son. His parents and three brothers, Roy, Jennings and Renhard, have the profound and deep sympathy of all in their deep sorrow.

The funeral occurred this afternoon, Rev. J. N. Andersen of the Synod church officiating. Brief services were held at the residence, where the pastor spoke the words of the Savior, "Philip, Follow Me," and applied them to the deceased. At the church the pastor spoke on Ecclesiastes 12:1: "Remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth, while the evil days come not, nor the years draw nigh, when thou shalt say, I have no pleasure in them."

The church choir sang "One Sweetly Solemn Thought," and again, "Nearer, My God to Thee," as they bore the casket. There were many floral offerings, including pieces from school mates, classmates, associates, relatives and other friends. The pall bearers were Harold Bond, Orlan Sandbo, Arne Solverson, Arnold Nelson, George Lunstead and Sumner Benson. Philip's class from the high school and teachers attended in a body, and the church was well filled with sympathizing friends.

The interment took place at Fairview. "Death is a hard master. He would take from us our brightest and best, but he cannot even mar memory. It will serve as a balm to our wounded hearts."

OLOF O. HANDE.

Olof O. Hande died very suddenly Sunday evening, February 27. Apparently in the best of health, he returned from church and after changing his clothes, he retired to his room.

He was about one hundred and fifty years of age, and had been in the throes of death. The doctor was immediately sent for and he stated that heart failure was the cause of his death.

Deceased was the youngest son of Ole and Dortha Hande, who live on their homestead near Sunburg. Olof was born August 1, 1885, and has spent his life at his parents' home. He was a quiet, steady young man, with a clean reputation, and well liked by all who knew him.

He was an active and respected member of the Young People's Society and a member of the Sunburg band. The funeral which took place Friday at the West Norway Lutheran church was unusually well attended, about fifty rigs filling the center aisle. The pastor officiated taking text for his sermon, the 12th verse of 90th Psalm.

Besides the regular funeral hymns, the choir sang "Nearer My God to Thee," and "God Be With You Till We Meet Again."

The casket was covered with beautiful flowers, among them being a floral harp from the members of the band, a huge wreath from the Young People's Society. The pall bearers were A. C. Berg, C. G. Gandard, Carl Ellingboe, Bert Teige, Ellin Peterson and A. J. Syse.

PLANS ARE READY FOR OPERA HOUSE

Contract to Be Let in a Few Days And Work Will Begin At Once.

The plans for the new opera house were received last week by Alton Crosby. The new building will be one that will be a credit to the city in every respect.

One important change is to be made in that the building will be ten feet wider than was the former structure. It will be built up close to the J. H. Wiggins Co. building, while the distance between it and the bank building, will be the same as before.

The material used in the construction of the front, will be something along the same line as before, altho the trimmings will be of a different nature and design. The highest point of the roof will be equal to the height of the bank building, 36 feet.

The lobby will have a tiled floor, and white tiling will run up four and one-half feet on the right and left walls. Above the stage glass mirrors will be placed. The box office will be in the center of the lobby with an entrance on each side.

In the interior of the building there will be a foyer. The dressing rooms will be in the gallery will be at the left as one enters the auditorium. A change in the interior is being contemplated, which, if made, will add greatly to the comfort of the patrons.

The auditorium will be two aisles formerly in use. There will be an aisle down each side of the auditorium, next to the wall, and another down the center, thus making it easier for those sitting in seats near the walls to see the stage or screen.

Upholstered seats will be installed, and they will be a distance of thirty-two inches apart, making them nice and roomy.

The stage will be practically the same as before, and the dressing rooms will be in the basement. Fan exhaust system of ventilation will be used, making it possible to have fresh air every seven minutes.

The gallery will have in the neighborhood of one hundred and fifty seats, and in the northeast corner, the private office of Mr. Crosby will be located. The fireproof booth will be in the center of the gallery.

At the right and left with the main entrance there will be two rooms suitable for stores of some kind. Contracts will be let within the next ten days, and then work will begin in earnest, and hasten to completion as quickly as possible.
