STOCKBRIDGE SACHM SPEAKS.

A large audience greeted Samuel A. Miller, the Indian lecturer, at the Synod church last night. He was introduced by Prof. A. C. Pederson, of the Willmar Seminary, who had been instrumental in securing him for an appearance at Willmar. Rev. Miller is a graduate of Carleton, and is the sachem of his tribe, the Stockbridges, which is literally "The Last of the Mohicans," a remnant of the powerful Mohawks. There are about 500 souls in the tribe. They are located about twenty-five miles from the Synod Winnebago Indian Mission at Wittenberg, Wis. Rev. Miller is affiliated with the German Lutheran Missouri Synod, and his talk was largely religious. Rev. J. N. Anderson made some closing remarks, thanking Rev. Miller for his visit.
