GRADE SCHOOL PUPILS MAKE FINE BIRD HOUSES

Fine Lot of Houses the Result of Interest Shown by Children.

That a great deal of interest is being evinced in the bird house contest being held by W. M. Chase & Co., is shown by the number of houses which have been and are being constructed by pupils of the grade schools in this city. A representative of the Tribune visited a number of the grades in the Central building with Supt. Foster Tuesday morning and no less than fifty-five houses were on exhibition in the various rooms, and in addition more will come in the latter part of the week.

As an added incentive to the pupils the boy and girl in each room, whose house is adjudged the best, will receive a half holiday.

Houses on exhibition show clearly the benefits derived from the manual training work by the pupils. Included in the number are houses of all sizes and descriptions, ranging from ten inches by six, to several that measure two and a half feet square and stand about eighteen inches high. Original ideas in the construction are also in evidence. One noticed was made of tin, two or three others after the fashion of a log cabin, several others from birch bark.

Superintendent Foster states it is the plan to make the school exhibit at the County Fair next fall, one on birds. These houses will be shown as work from the department of manual training, classes in drawing will have pictures of the various birds and the grammar classes will have compositions and stories about birds.

CREAMERY HAS RECORD MONTH

Kandiyohi Central Creamery Association Did a Fine Business During Month of March.

The Kandiyohi Central Creamery Company had one of the best months in its history in March. Inquiry of Secretary C. J. Nelson informs the Willmar Tribune that 13,698 pounds of butter were manufactured in March. The receipts for the month amount to about \$5,000. The price paid for butter fat was 40 cents per pound, which mark was only reached once before, in December, 1911. The following patrons received checks for one hundred dollars or more during the month of March: C. O. Bergquist, \$138.10; O. H. Johnson, \$120.15; Olaus Anderson, \$117.05; and Charles Chellberg, \$100.90. The following drew checks ranging from fifty to one hundred dollars: Chas. Johnson, Andrew Anderson, Anton Thorsen, F. E. Cronquist, A. C. Balk, Wm. Carlson, William Hallberg, C. A. Berg, B. Bredeson, Ed. Carlson, H. Lundy and C. J. Nelson. There were ten others who had over \$50 before their butter bids were deducted. The Kandiyohi Central patrons are convinced that it pays them to stick to their Co-operative Creamery.
