P. D. RINGSTROM.

After an illness with cancer of the stomach, Peter D. Ringstrom passed away last Monday, May 1, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Wm. Krager, in the township of Harrison. He was born March 17, 1844, in Sweden, and was 72 years, 1 month and 14 days old at the time of his death. He was the son of Nels and Ingra Ringstrom. He came to this country when about 27 years old and came direct to Atwater, arriving here May 24, 1871. He was employed here for some time and then went to Breckenridge and later to Alexandria. Some time later, Nov. 27, 1872, he was married to Johanna Christoferson in Harrison, and moved to her claim, where they commenced farming. Later he rented the farm and sold agricultural implements. In March, 1888, he rented the Grove City House and moved to that village. Four children were born to them, namely, Nels of Grove City; Oscar, of Belgrade; Mrs. Alice Martinson, of Grove City; and Mrs. Sarah Krager, of Harrison. Besides his four children he leaves fourteen grandchildren, two sisters, Mrs. Belinda Johnson of Evansville, Minn., and Mrs. Peter Schoberg of Grove City. Mr. Ringstrom has made his home with his daughter in Harrison for the past year.

The funeral was held last Wednesday with services at the home at 1 o'clock and at the Swedish Lutheran church in Atwater at 2 o'clock. Rev. Berg officiating. Interment was made at the Atwater Union cemetery.


