


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POLICYHOLDERS ENJOY FINE PICNIC



The cutter bar may be raised by the foot lift alone in the ordinary manner to pass over slight obstructions without throwing the mower out of gear. When the bar is raised beyond this point with the hand lever, the clutch is thrown out of gear automatically and remains out of mesh as long as the cutter bar is held above this position. It automatically goes into gear and sets the knife in motion as soon as the bar is again lowered.
