Moved and seconded that the aforesaid Ordinance be considered and given its first reading. Carried.

The said ordinance was then read. Alderman Erickson introduced an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance amending Ordinance No. 189, (An Ordinance Licensing and Regulating the Carrying of Passengers for hire within the Limits of the City of Willmar, Minnesota.)"

Moved and seconded that the aforesaid Ordinance be considered and given its first reading. Carried.

The said Ordinance was then read. Alderman Millard introduced an Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Creating a Fire Equipment Fund, providing for the manner in which said Fund shall be maintained and determining the purposes thereof."

Moved and seconded that the aforesaid Ordinance be considered and given its first reading. Carried.

The said Ordinance was then read. Chairman Millard of the Sewer Committee presented a petition for extension of Sanitary sewer on Russell Street, First Ward, signed by A. Stansberry, C. Rasmussen, S. Geo. Harstad, to have sewer extended on said street, beginning 334½ feet north from the center of Ella avenue and extending north from said point a distance of 320 feet.

The estimated cost of said extension, including man-holes, was stated to be \$146 and there was pledged for tapping fee \$125.

The Sewer Committee recommended that said extension be made, and that approximately \$21, be appropriated from the Sewer Fund to assist in building said extension.

The report of the Sewer Committee was, on motion, approved by the Council.

A. Flygare made application to connect the shoe store building on south part of Lots 11 and 12, Block 29 with the 4th Street sewer. The said application was, on motion, granted; no tapping fee to be charged as said property had been assessed for the construction of said 4th street sewer.

City Attorney Stanford presented a deed from D. A. Murray, Anton Swenson and wife to the City, for a tract of land to be used for street purposes near the Great Northern Round House.

Alderman Erickson offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:

RESOLUTION. Whereas, Daniel A. Murray and Anton Swenson and wife have heretofore offered to dedicate to the City of Willmar for street purposes, and have executed and delivered a proper Quit Claim deed to the City of Willmar, for said purposes, covering the following described property, to-wit:

That part of the North half of the Northeast quarter (NE1-2 of NE1-4) of Section Fourteen (14), Township 119, Range 35, described by metes and bounds as follows: Commencing at a point on the west line of said NE1-2 of NE1-4 of Section 14, said Township and Range, which is 501 feet south of the corner section corner common to Sections 11 and 14, said township and range; thence running east and parallel to the section line between said section 11 and 14, a distance of 693 feet; thence running north at right angles a distance of 66 feet; thence running west and parallel to the section line between said sections 11 and 14 a distance of 596 feet; thence running in a southwesterly direction a distance of 125 feet to the place of beginning.

THEREFORE, RESOLVED, That said dedication and said deed and the property therein described, be and the same be hereby accepted.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That the City Clerk be and he is hereby instructed to place said deed of record.

RESOLUTION. That the Building Inspector, be, and he is hereby instructed not to issue any permit for moving any building until the licensed house-mover shall first have deposited with the Water and Light Department, and with the Northwestern Telephone Exchange Company, and with the Tri-

State Telephone and Telegraph Company, and with each of them, a sufficient sum of money to pay the cost and expense of removing and replacing all electric light wires, and all telephone wires and cables, nor until such housemovances shall have presented to the Building Inspector, a statement from the Water and Light Department, and from the Northwestern Telephone Exchange Company, and from the Tri-State Telephone and Telegraph Company, and each of them, certifying that such deposit has actually been made.
