**MORE WATER FOR THE CROW**  
 Big Judicial Ditch Would Send a Flood Past Hutchinson.  
 City Engineer Lewis H. Merrill has been spending a considerable portion of his time lately in Meeker and Kandiyohi counties, looking up the project of this consequence can be put over without objectors demanding a hearing, and in this case there are about 30 of them, mostly in Cedar Mills and Cosmos townships who have employed Mr. Merrill to make surveys showing the extent to which their farms along Crow river will suffer if the project goes through. There are about 75 objections along the line of the proposed ditch.  
 The ditch is numbered Judicial Ditch No. 8 and the hearing on the petition was set for Sept. 13 before Judge Quale at Willmar. It starts from Little Kandiyohi Lake, running southeast through the towns of Fahlun, Lake Elizabeth, East Lake Lillian and into Meeker county. With its proposed tributaries it will be about 60 miles in length and affect 361 landowners. The main ditch is not to be dug by the engineer, John Norgaard, would be 30 feet wide at the bottom and in many places 60 feet at the top.  
 In addition to the big ditch the project includes the deepening and straightening of Crow river where it flows through Cosmos and East Lake Lillian. It is obvious that unless the river were deepened and straightened its entire length there would be an overflowing of lands along the river's course through those towns and there are many farmers there prepared to fight the big ditch project to the last ditch.—Hutchinson Leader.

**Composition of an Army.**  
 In the United States an army is made up as follows: One hundred men constitute a company, four companies a battalion, three battalions a regiment, three regiments a brigade and from three to four brigades a division, all in Germany and Great Britain there are about 20,000 men in a division and 40,000 in an army corps. In the German organization a division of infantry is made up of two brigades, a brigade of two regiments, a regiment of six battalions. A cavalry division is composed of three brigades of two regiments each and two or three batteries of horse artillery.—New York Times.

**Italian Staff of Life.**  
 To those who know the Italian staff of life only in one or two forms it will come as a surprise that there are some forty-four varieties, all carefully differentiated. Neapolitan macaroni is usually made simply of household flour, well mixed, rolled flat and then shaped by various machines, but the paste may be mixed with other ingredients. Thus tagliatelli is produced by the addition of eggs, and into butter and cheese sauce. Italian children may learn their letters and numerals from edible copies, and leaves and shells are some of the many forms which macaroni takes as biscuits do with us.—London Chronicle.

**Swinder Offers Grocery Bargains.**  
 Reports are circulating to the effect that a smooth-spoken solicitor has been operating in certain parts of rural Minnesota. He takes orders for groceries. He offers sugar and the other staples at ridiculously low prices. Other articles likely to be taken in small quantities are offered at the usual or at even high prices. **A Picture Of Peace**

Needing a model for a painting of a female figure I intended to call "Peace." I hunted everywhere for one. I could find plenty of women with suitable figures, but figure expresses nothing that I wanted except symmetry. I painted my picture in my studio, using a model for the figure whom I have often employed, leaving a blank space for the face, intending if ever I found one suitable to my purpose I would introduce it. She was sewing, and since the window in which she sat was at an angle with mine I got a three-quarters view of her face. This was the position of my figure of "Peace" in my picture.  
 I noticed that the girl occupied the same position nearly every morning from about 10 o'clock till noon. It occurred to me to bring my canvas and my implements to my room and use the girl for a model. She would be unconscious that she was being used for the purpose, and this would be a great advantage. So I transferred my materials from my studio to my chamber, and closing the blinds so that my model would not see me copying her, I set to work. Fortunately I seldom missed getting a sitting each morning.  
 My picture was a great success. How much its being displayed when the European war was in progress had to do with the public's appreciation of it I don't know. Naturally the war time in the gallery where it was hung and noticed that the expressions of all who viewed it were for the time being softened.  
 But one who listens to criticisms of his work will surely hear some fault-finding. During these eavesdroppings I heard one adverse comment. Two ladies were viewing it when one said: "She's a spiteful."  
 "Good gracious!" exclaimed the other. "What do you mean? She is the impersonation of amiability. How could you have got such an impression?"  
 "I don't know, but I've got it all the same."  
 They passed on, leaving me wondering how one person of the many hundreds who looked at the picture should have divined such a different interpretation of it from the rest. Surely the judgment of the many was of far more value than the one. Nevertheless the criticism troubled me. Might not others have got the same impression from my "Peace," but left it unexpressed?  
 However, my picture did much to introduce me as an artist, and my conscience had often pricked me for spying

**RESOLVED:** That sections First and Third of the Certificate of Incorporation of this Bank be amended to read as follows:

Section One, be amended to read "Farmers' State Bank of Kandiyohi, Incorporated," instead of "State Bank of Kandiyohi."  
 Section Third, be amended to provide for a capitalization of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) instead of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00). We hereby certify that the foregoing was duly adopted by a majority vote of the Capital Stock, at a meeting duly called for that purpose and held at the Banking House in Kandiyohi, Minnesota, on the 11th day of September, A. D. 1916.
