



In addition to health officers, physicians and visiting nurses, it is expected that the school people of the state and many others interested in health matters will attend in large numbers.

In contrast to the program held during the day, this will be for the most part technical in nature and is intended primarily for physicians who will be in attendance at the annual meeting of the State Medical Association, October 12th and 13th.
