First Newspaper Woman of Minnesota.  
A Remarkable Woman of Antebellum Days—1815-1885

CHAPTER LII.  
Find Work.

That evening I wrote to the New York Tribune, relating the incident of the man asking for cooling drinks, and saying that if people furnished the material, I would devote my time to distributing their gifts. Next morning I got two dozen lemons, pressed the juice into a jar, put in sugar, took a glass and spoon and, so soon as visitors were admitted, began giving lemonade to those men who seemed to have most need. Going to the water tank for every glass of water made it slow work, but I improved my walks by talking to the men, hearing their wants and adding to their stock of hope and cheerfulness, and was glad to see that the nurses did not seem to object to my presence, even though Campbell was the one only hospital in the city from which female nurses were rigorously excluded.

At the door of Ward Three, a large man stood, and seemed to be an officer. I asked him if there were any patients in that ward who would need wine paddado. He looked down at me, and said:

"I think it very likely, madam, for it is a very bad ward."

**PRICES OF POTATOES EXPECTED TO DROP**  
Princeton Prices May Prevail at Other Places in the Near Future.

The city of Princeton which boasts of being the largest potato shipping center in the country is offering potatoes at seventy-five and eighty cents per bushel according to former State Auditor Dunn's Princeton Union last week which had the following to say about the potato situation:

"Potato prices declined sharply Monday, and in Minneapolis tubers dropped 40 cents per bushel, or from \$1.50 to \$1.10. This morning from 75c to 80c was being paid on the local market. Receipts continue fair and there is no marked change in the quality."

"Reports from various sections of the United States show that the yield of potatoes in eastern growing states will exceed that of last year, but there is a corresponding decrease in the Great Lakes states. The Mountain and Pacific coast states were blessed with a good crop, but the yield in the entire country will be some less than in 1915."

The frost of the 15th, 16th and 17th injured northern potato crop prospects.

Wisconsin was more seriously affected than other states. Reports vary at the different leading points, but all say the frosts have affected the crop, and will cause an even lighter yield than was predicted before the cold weather came. In most places the vines were killed, preventing further growth, and inasmuch as the potatoes were small at the time it is estimated only half to two-thirds will be of marketable size.

Minnesota was not affected as seriously by the frost as Wisconsin particularly because the crop was further advanced. The production at practically all stations, however, is lighter than last year, according to the reports. It is believed that the crop in Michigan escaped frost damage. The cold spell was experienced there, but the nights were cloudy, and the vines evidently survived the frost. Reports from the principal sections say that the crop has not been affected to any particular extent, and the state is expected to have a fair crop, although it will be considerably behind last year.

The potato crop report issued September 1 by the Federal Department of Agriculture indicates a total yield for the entire country, including that of 1915 of 359,000,000 bushels; the 1910-1914 average of 361,000,000, and the August 1, 1916 forecast of 364,000,000 bushels.—Morris Tribune.

**OBITUARY**  
**MRS. HANS DAHL.**

Another old settler in Harrison, Mrs. Hans Dahl, passed away last Sunday, Oct. 1, after suffering for a time from paralysis.

Christine Berglund Dahl was born Sept. 19, 1839, in Hudiksvall, Sweden, and was at the time of her death 77 years and 12 days old. She was married at Ocoala, Wis., August 8, 1870, to Hans Dahl, and to this union was born four sons, three of whom survive: Samuel M., Louis D., and Albert E. Dahl, all well known and highly respected citizens in the same township.

Mr. Dahl died at 8 o'clock, of this year, and shortly after his death Mrs. Dahl suffered a stroke of paralysis and has been helpless ever since. She came to America in 1866 and to Kandiyohi county in 1872. A sister, Mrs. Peter Felt of Willmar, and a nephew, Peter Berglund of Harrison, also survive her. The funeral was held at the Harrison Presbyterian church, with services at the home at 1 o'clock and at the church at 2 o'clock, Rev. Fred Stromberg, of the Swedish M. E. church of Atwater conducting the rites. The sympathy of the community goes out to the bereaved ones.—Atwater Republican Press.
