



The high school football team played their second game of the season last Saturday afternoon, and were defeated after a hard struggle by the fast Renville high team.

The game was played at Renville, and was an exceptionally good contest. A bad few minutes at the opening of the second half resulted in the defeat. With the exception of ten minutes after the whistle blew, opening play in the third period, the Willmar team held their own. When they went to pieces, however, they went with a bang, and before they came back to earth, the nineteen points had been rolled up, and the game was safe for Renville, as their defense was imprudent for the remainder of the game.

Securing the ball on the kickoff, Willmar marched straight down the field to within the shadow of the home team's goal, only to lose the ball on a bad fumble, when a score seemed a certainty.

Chester Nelson, playing at the tackle position played a whole of a game, and was thru the line, piling up Renville plays time and again.

He was ably assisted by Eddie Christoferson and Lloyd Peterson. Joe Chase at the pivotal position also played a nice game, and his passing was good. The Willmar team were drawn in time and again on crisp crosses and wide end runs, netting Renville most of their gains in this manner. For Renville the work of quarterback O'Connor stood out prominently as far as going the dummies of his team was concerned, and as to his choice of plays. Right end E. Radtke also comes in for a lot of credit for the magnificent game he put up.

The entire Renville backfield performed in finisher style according to those from here who witnessed the game.

The local high school football team is not one whit disheartened over the two defeats they have suffered thus far this season. On the contrary they are out on the practice field every afternoon after school, working their heads off, figuratively speaking, under the tutelage of Wilbur Young. He has the boys instilled with a lot of pep, something that has been lacking in local teams of late years, and they fight for every point. More candidates for the team are being picked after this season than in years.

For the most part the squad is composed of inexperienced men, but before the season ends they are going to make themselves heard from.

The fact that the Litchfield high school football teams are rapidly getting out of the class of teams in this section of the state is proven by the nice tie tripping handed the St. Cloud Normal team, last Saturday, the score being only 69 to 2.

Willmar travels to Benson Saturday of this week, looking for one of the hardest games of the season. Benson defeated Morris, last Saturday, and as nothing so pleases a Benson team as to win a well earned victory from a team representing this city, an interesting time may be looked for.

The local team is likely to be in a more or less crippled condition Saturday, owing to the fact that Christoferson and Peterson are indisposed, owing to scholastic difficulties. It is also said that Capt. Nelson will be unable to perform this week, but there is a possibility of his becoming eligible before Saturday.

The Carleton College football team made the entire middle west sit up and take notice last Saturday when they defeated the haughty university of Chicago team by a score of 7 to 0.

The best supporters of the Northfield boys looked for was a close game, while Chicago rooters (and evidently the players, too) looked upon the game as a practice affair.
