### The Red River Derby.

A new feature which will add a high degree of interest and excitement to the programme of the Outdoor Carnival this year will be the dog team race from Winnipeg to St. Paul. This will be known as the Red River Derby, to be run annually and will be open to the best dog teams of the world. It will be modelled after the famous derby of Alaska which has become a sporting classic and will be followed by as much interest as any thoroughbred event of the palmy days of horse racing. Starting from Winnipeg the dogs and their sled drivers will race a distance of over 500 miles through the large cities of the Northwest and will finish at St. Paul during the Carnival period. Suitable prizes will be offered and the progress of the race will be followed by wire all over the world. No event of this kind has ever been staged in this section and it will add a new sporting zest to the already large field of sports which the carnival will promote. Five or more dogs comprise a team and these must be driven carefully and their strength and endurance husbanded that they may be able to have their best speed for the final stretches of the event. The distance of the racing course from Winnipeg to St. Paul, as practically determined upon at this time, will be over 500 miles and this means that the dogs comprising the teams entering must be trained perfectly for the great endurance test. Drivers of these races must often exhibit as great feats of endurance as do their faithful animals for the race is a cross-country race.

The drivers of the Alaskan races have been known to continue for days and nights without sleep and with very little food.

Find Metal's History.

It is not always a massive hammer and a lusty blow that determines whether a material is strong enough, or good enough, for use in Dodge Brothers cars. An acid treatment follows, that reveals the entire history of the piece of metal to the metallurgist so that he is enabled to tell with absolute accuracy just how the piece was made, how it was treated, and whether it will perform the function for which it was intended.
