FRANKLIN V. HANSEN KILLED IN WRECK

Rear-End Collision Smashes Caboose at Sherman, on Sioux Line.

Two men were killed and eleven others wounded, several seriously, in a rear-end collision at Sherman, S. D., a little town a short distance from Gettysburg, this (Wednesday) morning. The dead are Franklin Hansen, conductor of this city, and a stock man, whose name we have been unable to learn. The wounded men were all traveling with cattle to the city markets.

BIG DEBATE THURSDAY

Last Chance to Hear 1916 Champions of 7th District on E. S. Debating Team.

On Thursday evening of this week the Willmar debating team will meet the team from Cokato high school, at 7:45 at the high school auditorium. This will undoubtedly be the last opportunity for the public to see and hear last year's champions of the seventh district. Cokato has been represented in state debates for a number of years, but has never met Willmar before. They recently contested with the team of the North high school, Minneapolis, and made an excellent showing. The Willmar team will consist of two classes, Evelyn Anderson and Geraldine Halsey. The subject to be discussed is: "Resolved: that the United States should further restrict immigration by means of a literacy test."

This promises to be one of the best debates of recent years as Cokato is a very strong team. Mr. Youngquist, of the local faculty will preside, and the judges will be Professors Pederstad and Harstad of the Seminary and Mrs. Wm. Hennigster.

In addition to the debate, music will be furnished by the Victoria and by the high school glee club. The prices of admission will be but fifteen and twenty-five cents. Everyone is cordially invited to be present.

SECTION MAN IS FATALLY INJURED

Martin Miller Run Down By Engine Near Coal Chute Last Saturday.

A fatal accident occurred in the east end of the local railroad yards last Saturday afternoon about two o'clock, when Martin Miller, employed on the section, was run over by an engine, suffering injuries which caused his death at seven o'clock that evening. At the time of the accident, Miller was chopping ice from a switch near the coal chute. The fact that the wind was blowing hard, together with other noise, deafened him to the sound of the approaching engine, which was coming from the rear. The engine, which was coupled to the south bound train on the Sioux City division. He was thrown to the side of the tracks, but the wheels ran over his legs, cutting them both off over the knee and ankle. An engine was pressed into service at once and the injured man taken to the passenger station where he was met by Dr. Frost, and taken to the Bethesda hospital. Here everything possible was done, but to no avail, as the man passed away at seven o'clock the following evening.

The unfortunate victim of this accident was born in Trondhjem, Norway, about forty-seven years ago. He has lived at Willmar about fifteen years, and has been an employe in the Great Northern yards and on the section for many years back. He is mourned by a wife, a daughter, a son, a sister, and two children, Myrtle, age 14, and Ruby, age 12. Six children have died in infancy. His surviving family have the deep sympathy and pity of the community in their terrible affliction.

Outside of his wife, he had no relatives on this side of the Atlantic. He is supposed to have brothers and sisters in Norway, but his surviving family here know but little about them.

The funeral will be held at the Free church at ten o'clock Thursday morning. Rev. Nicolay Nilsen to officiate.

OBITUARY

ANNA M. FEIG.

The aged grandmother in one of our best-known pioneer families passed away last Tuesday, Feb. 13, at the old homestead in Harrison, when Mrs. Anna M. Feig, widow of the late Conrad Feig, passed away after an illness of twenty days with the grippe. She attained the age of 83 years, 7 months and 28 days.

Mrs. Anna Marie (Hechel) Feig was born June 15, 1833, at Elenkoben, Rhenish Bavaria. She was married to Conrad Feig in Germany in 1859, and emigrated same year to United States, landing at New Orleans. In 1860 they came to Minneapolis and ten years later to this country when they located on the old Sperry place in Harrison. The husband died Oct. 4, 1916.

She is mourned by the following children: John Feig of Willmar; Geo. H. Feig of Portland, Ore.; Mrs. Henrietta Ziehl, Mrs. William Rieff, and Edward Feig of Harrison and Mrs. Fred Westerkamp of Springfield, Minnesota, and their respective families, by the family of the late Henry Feig, and other relatives. There are twenty-five grand children and eight great grand children.

The funeral occurred at the German Lutheran church in Town of Harrison on Saturday, Feb. 17, Rev. F. C. Rathoff officiating. Six of the grandchildren took place in the family lot in the German Lutheran cemetery.

The date neither team has been defeated this season, and unless the college team meets defeat in the game to be played Thursday evening at Pergus Falls, when they play Park Region College, two teams with absolutely clear records for the season will face each other. The Luther team are recognized as the fastest college quints in the middle states, and each year turn out aggregations that are worthy of holding their own with the best of them. This season is no exception judging from the record made by the team. One of the members of the squad is well known to local people, Harold T. Tallaksen, who played a forward position on the Seminary team a few years ago. Although he is not on the regular team, he has been getting into games regularly, and next week he will be at the front position. He may play against Willmar Friday evening.

The makeup of the team to face the speed quints will be the same that has represented the city in the games to date this season. Harold Severinson and the Nordstrom will be at the forward positions, Tim Norling center, with Buck and Bob Johnson at the guards. Without a question these five form the speediest team that ever represented the city.

The game Friday evening will be called at eight o'clock sharp, and the price of admission will be twenty-five cents for all. The expenses of bringing the Luther team here are exceedingly heavy, making it necessary to charge the one price.

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COUNTRY CLUB HOUSE PLANNED AT SPICER

Move is On to Acquire Green Lake Shore Property for Golf Links.

The matter of a country club for Green Lake was carefully considered at a meeting of about thirty enthusiasts, held last Monday evening at the Commercial Club rooms. There has been agitation for the club for some little time passed, and a list has been circulated the past few weeks, with the result that a surprisingly large number have agreed to join. At the meeting on Monday evening there were some over fifty names, citizens of this city, Spicer and New London.

Russell Spicer was chosen as temporary chairman and R. W. Stanford as temporary secretary of the organization. The following committees were appointed: "Committee to present proposed Articles of Incorporation and By-laws—R. W. Stanford, E. C. Wellin and S. O. Diefendorf. "Site and Grounds—D. N. Tallman, Oscar A. Orred and C. S. Sherry. "Membership—W. E. Scott, Chas. Wallin, C. W. Odell.

Plans for Club House—J. H. Olsen, C. S. Sherry, W. E. Scott. The plan is to build the club house just across the road north of where the present grand stand is situated. The grounds are to include about seventy acres, including the present site of the ball park. This will be made into a golf links. About \$3,500 will be expended on the club house at the start. There will be bath houses, tennis courts, golf links, and accommodations for many forms of recreation and sport. In the club house there will be one large room, which will be used as a dining room and dance pavilion. There will also be sleeping rooms in connection.

The idea of a country club for Green Lake is not entirely new, and now that the project has been launched, it bids fair to bring much more pleasing publicity to Green Lake and this city.

TOM NELSON BRINGS HOME THE BIG CUP

Our County Holds Championship of Central Minnesota for White Dent Corn.

Thos. T. Nelson, the Spicer seed corn grower, was in the city yesterday and exhibited the fine \$75 silver cup which he won at the First National Bank Show at St. Paul, for the best ten ears of corn exhibited from the sixteen counties in Central Minnesota. This territory includes many of the best known corn growers of the Northwest, and to bring back this trophy to Kandiyohi county is an achievement of which Mr. Nelson as well as our residents in general may well feel proud. The prize was won by ten ears of Silver King White Dent.

Mr. Nelson makes a specialty of raising Silver King and Rustler White seed corn. His farm is located on the shores of Woodcock Lake, northwest of Spicer. He has buildings erected especially designed for curing seed corn. Mr. Nelson took first and sweepstakes on white dent at the last county fair.
