## MORTON BANK WINS SUIT AGAINST ADAMS

## Hardfought Case is Decided On Question of Law By Judge Qvale.

The spring term of district court is in session at the court house this week. Several cases have already been disposed of, but there remain three or four which will come up for jury trial. Monday morning was devoted to the granting of citizenship papers to nineteen petitioners, two of whom were absent.

To date the only case to come up is the Morton vs Frank E. Adams and Staggie A. Adams. The case is an outgrowth of the former New London bank cases. The plaintiff is suing to recover on a note for \$2,100 which he purchased from the promoters.

Thursday was spent in selecting a jury and taking the testimony of two witnesses. The case was continued Friday morning. Shortly after ten o'clock the jury was temporarily excused, while the attorneys argued before Judge Qvale as to the introduction of certain testimony. At this writing they are still presenting their arguments and it is not known what the outcome will be.

Lately the plaintiff was awarded judgment late this afternoon to the amount of \$2,100 and interest at the rate of seven per cent since Nov. 29, 1914. A stay of ninety days was granted.

## OBITUARY

**LENORA (BOYD) HENDRICKSON.** The sad death of Mrs. Lenora Hendrickson, wife of Rev. Alfred Hendrickson, occurred at Glasgow, Montana, on March 13, as briefly mentioned in last week's paper. Mrs. Hendrickson died in child birth, but was previously in good health.

The funeral had been announced for Sunday afternoon, but until Sunday morning it was not known whether or not the funeral party would arrive in time owing to Friday's storm. They were supposed to arrive on train No. 2 on Saturday, but from Wahpeton that train was sent over the Fergus division, and the passengers for Willmar were held at Wahpeton. They came in on No. 10 Sunday morning. Rev. Hendrickson and the two year old son, Mr. J. B. Boyd and Miss Lillian Boyd accompanied the casket from Glasgow, Mr. J. B. Boyd and Elmer Boyd, Earl Dunn Center, N. D., Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Peterson of Benson, all came on the same train. No. 10 Sunday morning. Mr. J. K. Stalanda and daughter, Semina also arrived Sunday morning on the same train. P. A. Hendrickson of Glasgow, Mont. Memorial services had been held at Glasgow, before noon on Saturday.

The casket was taken to the home of A. A. Hendrickson, 1111 1/2 St. on First street, where brief services were held before they were taken to the church for the funeral. The funeral services were held at 2:30 o'clock. The church was crowded to its full capacity with sympathizing friends. The services were conducted by Rev. J. N. Anderson, who read the text for the sermon, Rev. 7:13-17. The deceased lady was the organist of this church and a worker in the Sunday school for a number of years before her marriage to Rev. Hendrickson in 1914. There was a profusion of flowers from friends far and near. There were floral pieces from the Glasgow congregation and from the Vinje congregation, the Sunday school and Young People's Society. By request of the district the services were limited to the hospitals and sick people in the city after the funeral. Rev. P. A. Hendrickson, father of the bereaved husband, spoke briefly on behalf of the family. The Rev. J. N. Anderson, pastor of the church, and Rev. T. O. Kiland, Ould Knutson, Anton Kiland, O. A. Kiland and O. A. Grant, all of whom were present, took place in the Synod cemetery. The brother, Rev. A. A. Boyd of Manitowish, was unable to be present at the funeral.

Mrs. Lenora (Boyd) Hendrickson was born at Willmar, Sept. 21, 1886. Here she grew to womanhood. She became a graduate of the Willmar high school and of the Shortland and Typewriting Course at the Seminary where she afterwards became a teacher in these subjects. She was active in the North Pacific Saturday League in 1914 to Rev. Alfred Hendrickson, and they made their home at Glasgow, Mont. She was married to Rev. Alfred Hendrickson and one son, Ralph James, two years old. She is survived by her husband and mother, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Boyd, by four brothers and two sisters, and a large number of other relatives, many residing at Willmar.

**THOMAS JOHNSON, SR.** Thomas Johnson, Sr., a native of Seibo, Norway, and since 1868, a resident of Meeker county, not far from the city of Willmar, died at his home on Monday, Feb. 13, 1842, and leaves a widow and seven children among whom are Mrs. Bertha Estrem of Atwater, and Thomas Johnson, Jr., on the home farm. His death evidently occurred at Willmar on Monday, Rev. Hildfeld officiating.

**Capt. Rice Suffers Loss.** Gov. A. E. Rice returned last night from a trip to Hot Springs, Ark. He says there is no snow until one reaches the mountains of Chicago. Gov. Rice has recent information from Cuba, where his son, Capt. C. A. Rice, has interests, that the rebels have complete possession of the Province of Camaguey. Santa Clara, Funes and Sagua la Grande have been destroyed, as have the sugar mills valued at two million dollars. The rebels have taken hundreds of acres of cane, and horses and cattle have been taken from the ranches. The rebellion was of greater magnitude than reported in the daily papers. The recent victory of the government troops and capture of rebel chiefs have done much to restore order but it will take some time to disperse the rebel bands in the interior.



The one redeeming feature of the storm was the fact that the wind was not a cold one. The mercury hovered in the neighborhood of the freezing point practically during the entire storm. The snow was so heavy that it was hard to breathe. The numerous cuts along the Great Northern road in these parts made it impossible to run trains thru on Friday or until late Saturday.

The west bound mail train, with a double haul, started from St. Paul Friday morning and seemed to have a fair chance of getting thru all right. However, when the engines struck a drift some twenty feet in height, in a cut about two and a half miles east of this city, they came to a stop. The cut was caused by a peculiar accident too. Al Baldwin was running the head engine, and when the locomotive crashed into the big drift, the shock threw him from his seat. His hand was resting on the air brake, and when he lost his balance the air was thrown on the windows on his side of the cab where it piled up and froze. The snow piled up in several places. Attempts to make headway against the storm were futile. The train was held up until it was forced to remain until the storm had subsided a bit and the snow plow could get to it. A glance at the picture taken on Saturday morning at the scene of the accident gives one a better idea of conditions as they were, than can words.

Coming along behind the mail train was the afternoon passenger train. This train pulled into the neighborhood of scheduled time, about one thirty, and there it remained with its passengers abandoned until Saturday afternoon about four thirty. There were nearly a hundred passengers on the train, men, women, boys and girls and babies. There was the chance for residents of Kandiyohi to show their hospitality. Many of them did just that, and opened up their homes for the snow bound travelers. Heroic work by the Misses Ethel Govig and Alma Grimsby, two young ladies who are teaching at that place, did much to lessen the discomfort of the unfortunates.
