COLLEGE BOYS CHARM WILLMAR AUDIENCE

Lyric Male Chorus from Gustavus Adolphus College Make Willmar a Visit.

The Lyric Male Chorus of Gustavus Adolphus College sang to a full house last night at the Willmar Opera House and captivated their audience, which gave them their best attention and was very appreciative. The Lyric is one of the finest college student glee clubs in the country, and the members of the musical faculty which appeared on the program reflected the quality of work done in the Conservatory of Music at the G. A. C. The boy who spoke for the college was Vedel Linner of Littlefield. His reference to Archie Carlson as having brought fame to Willmar in college athletics was greeted with applause.

The boys arrived on the afternoon train. The district official in charge very courteously given a day coach for the use of organization, and this was decorated with a banner. The car was attached to No. 9 at night to take the boys to Moorhead, their next stop.

The Lyric visited the High School in the afternoon and gave several selections and speeches were made by Foster and Youngquist of the High School and Prof. Hedberg for the chorus. The chorus was taken to the State Hospital and was otherwise entertained in the city.

There were nearly five hundred tickets sold and the concert netted the visitors nearly \$100. They left Willmar greatly pleased with their visit to our city. We asked our musical critic to write a review of the concert and on short notice handed in the following:

BY PROF. R. V. MELBY:

To say that the concert given here Tuesday evening by the Lyric Male Chorus of Gustavus Adolphus College and the members of the musical faculty would not be giving them the credit due them. We believe that everyone who was present will remember us in saying that the performance was perfect in every way. The ensemble singing of the chorus showed artistic feeling to rhythm, interpretation and expression. The boys followed the leader's direction with a precision that was remarkable.

Messrs. Backstrom and Rydell won a place for themselves in the hearts of the audience with their well-chosen solos and duet. Mr. Anderson, the other soloist, in two very beautiful songs deserves much praise as do the other members of the chorus. The audience failed to enter into their spirit.

Prof. Walter Scott Johnson, violinist, handled his instrument like the true artist. He is a player who is selected soloist with a feeling long to be remembered by the people of Willmar. Prof. Johnson is a member of the Lyric Male Chorus of Gustavus Adolphus College and is a member of the organization of which he and Gustavus Adolphus College may well be proud. Everything considered the people of Willmar may well be glad of having had the opportunity of listening to and entertaining the Lyric Male Chorus.

OBITUARY

SAMUEL OSMUNDSON.

Samuel Osmundson, proprietor of the Osmundson Garage, old-time business man of Willmar, an early pioneer of county, passed away last Saturday, after a two months' illness with cerebral hemorrhage.

Deceased was born in Wisconsin Jan. 1, 1859, while his parents were arranging to locate in this county. His father, the late Thomas Osmundson, had selected his early claim on the south shore of Norway Lake in Lake Andrew township in the fall of 1858. Samuel was therefore one of the very first newly born white children to come to the Minnesota frontier in these parts. He remained on the farm until he was fourteen years of age. He attended the Augsburg Seminary, studied pharmacy, worked in the drug store of Dale & Rolfe, and started a music store of his own. During the last sixteen years he has been in the garage business. He is said to have brought the first auto to Willmar, started the first garage, and sold the first car in the city.

In 1879 he was married to Miss Carry Pommeroy, who survives him with three children—Henry A. Osmundson, Otto W. Osmundson and Miss Cora E. Osmundson, all of this city. He is also mourned by the mother, Mrs. H. H. Foster, Va.; and the following sisters and brothers—Mrs. Nellie Noren, Mr. Gunder Osmundson, Mr. Severt Osmundson and Mrs. Hendrick Johnson of Willmar; Mrs. August Sporring, Messrs. Olaf and Henry Osmundson of Minneapolis, Va.; Mrs. S. M. Graf of Denver, Colo.; and Mrs. Lena Palmer of Minneapolis; and a large number of other relatives.

The funeral will occur Thursday afternoon, April 19, at 2:30 o'clock from the Lutheran Free church, Rev. Nicolay Nilsen to officiate. Music arranged for includes selections by choir and solo by Mr. William Rykkoen. The pall bearers will be Messrs. John Williams, L. A. Wold, C. A. Nelson, Joseph Williams, G. E. Qvale and C. C. Selvig.
