

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Council Chambers, City Hall Bldg., Willmar, Minn., May 29, 1917.

Regular meeting of the City Council. Mayor Wellin called the meeting to order.

The following members of the Council were present on roll call: Mayor Wellin, Aldermen Erickson, Soderlund, Frilund, Berkness, Brown, Jensen, Erickson and Norman, 9 absent, none.

City Attorney Standerson was also present. The following bills were, on motion, referred to the Finance Committee:

RESOLUTION. Resolved, that the bid of Tribune Printing Co. for doing the official publishing of the City of Willmar for the ensuing year in Willmar Tribune at the following prices, to-wit: 15 cents per copy for the first 100 copies, 10 cents per copy for the next 100 copies, 5 cents per copy for the balance of the year, and a per folio for Council proceedings, 25 cents for financial statements, notices and a per folio for each sub-section, and 15 cents for each sub-section insertion, be and the same is hereby accepted, and the Mayor and City Clerk be and they are hereby authorized to enter into a contract with said Tribune Printing Co. for doing said publishing.

Resolved further, that Willmar Tribune be, and the same is hereby designated, as the official paper of the City of Willmar for the ensuing year. Approved May 29, 1917.

RESOLUTION. Whereas, a petition, proper in form and execution, and signed by the requisite number of property owners and other persons owning real property in the frontage of the abutting real property to be assessed, has heretofore been presented to the City Council praying for the sprinkling either with water or with crude oil, as the Council may determine, of the portion of First street extending from Augusta Avenue to Grace Avenue.

Therefore, Resolved, That a hearing be had on said petition at the Council Chambers in the City Hall building, in the City of Willmar, on the evening of the 11th day of June, at the hour of eight o'clock at which time and place the Council will consider, investigate and act upon said petition and determine whether such sprinkling is necessary and proper, and all persons interested may then and there appear and be heard.

Resolved further, that the City Clerk be, and he is hereby instructed to give notice of said hearing by one publication in the official paper as in the Charter provided.
