FARM CLUBS AT CO. FAIR GROUNDS

Farmers Enjoy Picnic Dinner and Listen to Speaking and Song —Prof. Wilson Present.

Threatening weather during the forepart of the day no doubt discouraged many from coming out to the Farmers' Club picnic at the fairgrounds yesterday, but nevertheless there was a goodly attendance of farm club folks. Sunnyside, Goldenrod and Svea clubs being well represented. The program was held in the auditorium beginning at 2:30 o'clock. Mr. E. L. Rodegob officiating as the chairman. The first number was a song by six young high school girls which was very well rendered. Postmaster Forsberg was called on to explain the object and purpose of the Liberty League. Representative P. H. Frye was the next speaker and in an impassioned address stirred the crowd on several questions which are confronting the farmers at the present time. He re-stated the intimation that the farmers are not doing their share in the present crisis. He took occasion to take a rap at the mail order business and declared that Sears & Roebuck and like concerns had done more to depopulate Minnesota than the immigration Bureau had done to bring people to our state. He protested against the sending out of salaried county agents to tell the farmers what to do. He held that the money can be conserved for more useful and vital purposes at this time. He said that Old Glory was going to come out victorious in the present struggle, not thru the New York business men and financiers who marched on parade to stir up the war spirit, but by the sacrifices of the sons of the common people sustained by the prayers of the mothers. But while our boys are fighting for democracy in Europe the danger is that autocracy is getting its grip on our own country. The following address was a song rendered by a male quartet consisting of Lars Pedersen, Merald Tollefson, Henry and Robert Johnson. They were enthusiastically received and responded to an encore. Then followed an address by A. D. Wilson of the University extension department. He gave several good reasons for maintaining farmers' clubs. He gave three practical ways by which the people of this country can help the food situation in the present war. First by using thirty-five per cent corn meal in our flour, by using a larger amount of vegetables and by cutting down meat consumption about 8 per cent. The last and a very pleasing number was a song by Ethel and Joseph Dougherty. The hour being late the farmers were anxious to get home to their work and nothing was done in the way of a county organization of clubs. Auto Accident.
