COUNTY FAIR IS BIG EVENT NEXT WEEK

1917 Fair Will Be a Hummer—All Are Asked To Co-Operate.

The seventeenth annual Kandiyohi County Fair takes place at the County Fairgrounds Park next week. The grounds were never in better shape. The track is in fine condition. Plenty of good amusement features have been provided. The exhibits will be received and placed on Wednesday. We have every reason to believe that the latter will be very good and representative of the county's resources. Some of our stock men hesitate to bring in their animals because of the scarcity of help and the busy season. But we wish to emphasize the great importance of the stock exhibits for a successful fair. The educational value of having all the representative breeds there for comparison and judging cannot be overestimated. That is why your fellow farmers have established these fairgrounds and the county and state has contributed towards erecting suitable shelter for the animals, and giving premiums to invite comparison. If there was no one ready to sacrifice time and effort to help make a fair, there would be no such event. If you believe in a certain kind of animals as making money for you on your farm, you should make the effort necessary to bring them to the notice of your fellow farmers and thus encourage them to secure better stock and improve the community. If everyone will do their share we have the stock in this county to make this fair the biggest event of its kind in West Central Minnesota.

What is true of the stock is also true of the other lines of industry. Bring in the best you have produced to help make the fair. Don't leave it entirely to others, but do your own share to help make it a success. The farm clubs will be serving their community in the most practical way by making their community exhibits.

The Kandiyohi County Loyalty League will provide a tent to be located north of the auditorium for speaking purposes. County Director W. A. Rice has arranged for speakers to talk here every day of the fair, and it is hoped to illustrate some of these talks with moving pictures. See program elsewhere in this paper.

Some good horse racing is assured. A good number of horses are coming in. Supt. Burns states that the entries are coming in at a rate that will give a very satisfactory speed program.

The amusement features are among

the very best ever contracted for the fair. Real balloon ascensions with double parachute drops are contracted for. In order to make successive drops from parachute to parachute an aeromat must ascend high into the skies.

The vaudeville numbers will include Arabian tumblers, and clever comedians, guaranteed by the Western Vaudeville Association of Chicago. Several bands of the county will furnish music. There will be plenty of fun for all. Bring the children! The boys and girls will greatly enjoy the features of the fair.

The park grounds have been all cleared out, so there is room to park many hundred automobiles in the shade. Everybody come and enjoy the great annual event, see the exhibits, hear the speakers, enjoy the fun and meet your friends from all part of Central Minnesota.

The stores and business places of Willmar have agreed to close their stores at one o'clock on Friday afternoon to enable all to enjoy an afternoon and evening at the fair.

A large circle of friends mingle their tears of regret with those of the sorrowing family.

DR. DAVISON HAS AUTO ACCIDENT

Is At Work Examining Recruits In Spite Of His Injuries.

Dr. P. C. Davison had a narrow escape from serious injury last Sunday evening at 5:45 o'clock, when a bolt in the steering gear of his Dodge sedan car gave way, while he was running at a forty-mile speed on the State road. He sustained broken ribs and some bruises and cuts. He refuses to take his injuries seriously, however, and is on hand to examine recruits this morning at the court house.

The accident occurred several hundred feet east of the corner on the state road where the road leads north to the Bethesda Homes. Dr. Davison was going at a high speed having left his wife at Green Lake and was coming to Willmar in response to an urgent call. When the steering gear went wrong he lost control of the car, and eye witnesses say it turned over three times, and stopped about fifty feet from the road, landing on the left side.

Mr. B. Y. McNairy saw the accident and was the first one to come to the scene. Dr. Davison found himself in the front of the car with the seat cushion over him. He rode in to the city with Dr. N. Tallman, and Dr. Benson examined and dressed his injuries. Two ribs were broken on the left side, the left arm and both legs were cut somewhat by glass, and he sustained a small gash in the back of the head.

The car was badly smashed. The side of the Sedan top and the windshield were smashed, front axle bent, and much other damage was done. It was pulled in Sunday evening.

STATE NURSE IS HERE.

Miss C. Frances Cameron, head nurse for the Minnesota Public Health Association, is in the city today. One meeting was addressed by her at Red Cross County Headquarters at the Loney Block this afternoon and another at the court house at 7:30 o'clock. She is in consultation with the officers of the local health society and those who are interested in its work. The matter of having a school nurse to visit schools and look after the health interests of the pupils was one of the main topics of discussion.

MRS. CHARLES G. ENGVALL.

Mrs. Amanda Engvall, beloved wife of Chas. G. Engvall of Roseland, passed from the scenes of this life last Sunday at the Willmar hospital. She was operated upon Saturday for the removal of gall stones, and was unable to recover from the shock.

Deceased was a native of Vexjö, Sweden, where she was born Mar. 9, 1872. Her mother died when she was fifteen years of age. About 1890 she came to this country and in 1898 was united in marriage to Mr. Chas. G. Engvall, at Chicago, Ill. In 1903 they came to their farm in Roseland township, but returned the following year made a trip to Sweden to visit her old home. Her father died nine years ago. In the spring of 1916 they again moved to their Roseland home, where they have since resided. The grief-stricken husband and two children—Thelma and Roy, 18 and 13 years old, have the sympathy of the community in the irreparable loss they have suffered. A sister of the deceased, Mrs. Caroline Anderson, passed away only two weeks ago, and was buried Aug. 26.

Mr. Engvall and children left today accompanying the remains of wife and mother to Chicago, where the funeral will take place next Sunday, Sept. 16. Interment takes place in Oakwood cemetery. The surviving members of the family will return to their Roseland home next week.
