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BIG COUNTY FAIR OPENS WITH RAIN

Big Features All in Readiness Awaiting First Chance to Show.

Rain, Rain, Rain! The first day of Kandiyohi County's greatest fair sees weeping clouds driven by an east wind. It is seriously interfering with the bringing in of exhibits. The officers who have worked hard to make the fair are trying hard to smile in the face of the conditions over which they have no control, and are hoping that the sun will smile tomorrow and later in the week. The entertainment features of the fair are all here to do their parts and a big time is assured if a chance. This morning's papers predict fair weather tomorrow.

The wet weather will interfere most seriously with the stock exhibits. Last night the Malters and J. S. Anderson had arrived with their lines of thoroughbred horses, and J. E. Patchin of Georgeville was the first to bring in Holstein cattle. There are about twenty-eight race horses on hand, eight or nine of them from the twin cities. Poultry exhibits had begun to arrive last night. Four farm clubs were decorating their booths and all was action and animation in the big exposition hall.

A special attraction opposite the entrance to the main building this year is a fountain waterfall with appropriate settings, which is the work of Eben E. Lawson and Hugh Campbell.

Dick Cruikshank, the noted aeronaut, is on hand with his big balloon and his red, white and blue parachutes. A special attraction on Friday, Children's Day and Willmar Day will be the dropping from the skies of a number of small red, white and blue parachutes which becomes the property of the children that first get them.

The midway is in readiness for the

crowd. The free attractions are ready to do their stunts on the big platform erected near the judge's stand. Friday is Willmar Day, and the stores of Willmar have agreed to close at one o'clock to give their employees a chance to attend the fair. The stores will re-open from 5 to 6 o'clock to give an opportunity for country people to get their parcels, etc.

The Loyalty League tent has been erected near the main building, and here speaking and demonstrations take place every day.

It will be a great fair, and don't miss it, even if you have to use your mud chains.

EIGHTY RECRUITS WILL GO SATURDAY

Banquet and Parade Planned Before Boys Entrain For World War.

The leave-taking of eighty recruits to the National Army from Kandiyohi county next Saturday will be a notable event in the history of the community. The arrangements are for a second section of Train No. 14, to leave at about two o'clock before the regular train. Two coaches will be set off for the Kandiyohi county boys on the side track at the foot of Fifth street. The coaches with recruits from Morris, Benson, Granite Falls and other points with the Willmar coaches will be made up into a train at Willmar as soon as possible after the arrival of these trains and will proceed at once, it is expected at about two o'clock.

The recruits that are called to the colors and the alternates have been notified to appear at the courthouse at nine o'clock Saturday. There will be roll call and each recruit will receive a badge, with the words, Kandiyohi County, Minnesota. The next three hours will be busy ones at the courthouse, as each individual recruit will have to be given credentials, transportation and meal tickets involving much clerical work.

BANQUET AT NOON.

At twelve o'clock sharp the recruits will be guests of the Willmar Commercial Club at dinner. The G. A. R. veterans will also be guests of honor. There will be brief talks by Judge T. O. Gilbert, president of the Willmar Commercial Club, Gov. A. E. Rice for the G. A. R. comrades, and by Rev. J. N. Andersen.

THE PARADE.

At one o'clock there will be music at the courthouse yard by the Atwater Band, and the parade will start promptly at 1:30, moving east on Becker avenue, in the following order: Police and Fire Department in uniform.
